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






PREFACE

Our Most Lethal Weapon



The Greek philosopher Heraclitus said (a very long time ago): "you can never set foot in the same river twice, for it is not the same river and you are not the same person". This idea of constant change remains just as relevant today as it did in ancient Greece.

Change is hard...irrelevance is worse. To remain relevant, human thinking and cognitive performance must evolve to sufficiently keep pace with the rapid transformations happening worldwide. Technological advancements are becoming a pacing threat to human cognition. We must develop our Air Commandos via education, training, and experience to meet this challenge. AFSOC is at the forefront of advancing concepts vitally needed by the USAF as it rapidly shifts the way it organizes, trains, and equips in preparation for the next war. This shift has challenged USAFSOS to stay ahead of the bow wave of change and remain relevant at this INFLECTION point in history.

In response to this inflection point, USAFSOS aggressively teamed this past year with various AFSOC organizations leading the charge: hosting the "Mission Command" summit to help evolve USAF doctrine on mission command, working with the Air Commandos forging SOFFORGEN (now AFFORGEN), focusing on joint literacy with the orders process, the Joint Planning Process, staff competencies, and other efforts to work more effectively with partners and better understand the operational environment.

For the USAFSOS team of creative and critical thinkers, helping everyone in AFSOC to get after complicated, complex, and wicked problems is what we do. The school is a human-centric organization that believes humans are more important than hardware, and the most lethal weapon AFSOC can field is the human mind within every single Air Commando!

About USAFSOS

In March 1961, President John F. Kennedy, responding to Chairman Nikita S. Khruschev's clarion call for "wars of national liberation," cited the need for countering "subversion and guerrilla warfare" that were the heart of Communist insurgency.

As a result, the Air Force increased the emphasis given to special air warfare training. The U.S. Air Force Special Air Warfare School (USAFSAWS) was activated at Hurlburt Field in April 1967 under the Special Air Warfare Center. The school was redesignated the U.S. Air Force Special Operations School in 1968. The initial curriculum was The Special Air Warfare Indoctrination Course designed to prepare Air Force personnel for duty in Southeast Asia.



In June 1987, USAFSOS, as an organizational element of the 23rd Air Force, was assigned to the US Special Operations Command (USSOCOM), headquartered at MacDill AFB, FL.

In May 1990, the school became a direct reporting unit of the newly established Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC). In October 2008, with the standup of the Air Force Special Operations Training Center,



USAFSOS was placed under that unit, which was later reorganized on 11 February 2013 and renamed the Air Force Special Operations Air Warfare Center.

In 2017 USAFSOS moved under the newly formed 492d Special Operations Training Group. Most recently, USAFSOS has aligned to the Air Commando Development Center.

Since the days of the Vietnam War, USAFSOS has grown from teaching a single course to conducting 212 iterations of 22 unique formal courses and 36 customized, Mobile Education Events (MEEs) in AY23. USAFSOS currently provides SOFs indoctrination, as well as political, military, and cultural studies supporting SOF operations in the various combatant theaters. The school also provides language training, specialized education on special operations task units and groups, Air Commando Professional Leadership Development, building partner nation aviation capacity, and integration of Air Force Special Operation Forces (AFSOF) with theater specific assets.

The United States Air Force Special Operations School (USAFSOS) is located at Hurlburt Field on northwest Florida's Gulf Coast, five miles west of Fort Walton Beach. It is collocated with the 492nd Special Operations Wing in The Alison Building (Bldg 90503, 357 Tully Street), one block east of the Hurlburt Field Lodging Office.



USAFSOS Leadership Team

Lt Col Christopher S. Brooks, Commandant

Lt Col Brooks received his commission from the University of Central Florida, AFROTC program in 2005. After completing undergraduate combat systems officer training, he served as an E-3 navigator until transferring to become a U-28 CSO, serving as both an instructor and evaluator. In 2014, Lt Col Brooks was selected for the Foreign Area Officer program and completed a tour with the Joint Center for International Security Force Assistance, a JCS Chairman's Controlled Activity. Following his in-residence assignment at the Command and General Staff College, Lt Col Brooks served at Headquarters AFSOC as Deputy Branch Chief, A8PP.



Lt Col Clayton M. Pasco, Vice Commandant

As a Combat Aviation Advisor, Lt Col Pasco led advisory teams conducting foreign internal defense and security force assistance missions in Poland, Mauritania, and Niger. He also deployed as part of SOJTF-Operation INHERENT RESOLVE overseeing future operations planning in Iraq and Syria against the Islamic State. He has held positions at the squadron, wing, and combatant command levels. Prior to his current position, Lt Col Pasco was the operations officerof the 6th Special Operations Squadron, Duke Field, Florida.

SMSgt Anthony R. Shoels, Senior Enlisted Leader

SMSgt Shoels entered the Air Force in 2002. His background includes positions as a Weapons Load Crew Chief, Instructor Aerial Gunner that later merged into being an Instructor Special Missions Aviation in the HH-60G and TH-1H helicopters, and a MAJCOM Air Advisor Evaluator on the UH-60A helicopter. Support Department

The Support Department is chaired by Mr. Bob Love, who provides direction for 12 civilians and 4 contractors. The department is the center foundation of the school, reaching all aspects of education, instruction, and facility management. The team is responsible for the execution of information technology (IT) operations, security assistant, facility management, student and guest speaker support, resource management, audio-visual (AV), graphics, video teleconferencing, registrar functions, and the Blackboard Learning Management System. AUDIO VISUAL DIVISION

His team of dedicated AV specialists provided classified and non-classified multimedia and the associated software, hardware, and presentation systems for the school's auditoriums, classrooms, and meeting rooms to carry out USAFSOS's mission as well as other base units, including HQ AFSOC. The team continued to evolve this past year and continued to excel despite swapping our contractor position from Florecia "Flo" Savage to Ms. Connie Dover—Connie has not missed a beat. Flo was a by-name select into Mr. Gifford's previous position and is already making great strides within the GS world. Mr. Andre Newton and Mr. Craig Breen continued their unwavering excellent work supporting Remote Learning and In-house education throughout the CONUS and overseas alike. Much thanks to Andre as our mainstay and key in training

and developing both Flo and Connie over the last few months of the AY and into the new AY.

The AV Division is readily capable of providing presentation systems from legacy to present-day technology and provides Blackboard, Zoom, and MS Teams tech support for distance learning and guest speakers lectures ensuring interoperability of equipment and network connectivity to broadcast virtual subject matter experts to meet course objectives. Our classrooms feature fully upgraded digital systems, secure video teleconference (VTC) systems, classroom recording and video editing to support course iterations. The team not only supports squadron and command course requirements, but outside organizations requiring AV, VTC, and/or briefing rooms; this year alone they supported over 450 events. Lastly, the team started a review of equipment refresh requirements and with any luck, next year we will report on this great success!

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY DIVISION

Our IT Division is led by Mr. Gil "KP" Lujan and the team's roles include desktop support, remedying ticket resolution, issuing properly configured student laptops, and ensuring full adherance to all DoD and subordinate guidance. They literally support the squadron staff around the clock and the world! We are immensely happy to state, Ms. Whitney Williams was able to stay with our team transferring from contractor into the GS position vacated by Mr. Robert Thorne and she continues to be a tremendous asset. Mr. Jacob Goode started as our new contractor and he too, is learning and flourishing and meeting the IT demands. STUDENT SUPPORT DIVISION

Brenda was our expert guest speaker point of contact and provided travel itineraries for those coming to support us and the command—this is one facet of the schoolhouse we cannot do without, so her replacement will have big shoes to fill. The registrar function regularly coordinates with 200 quota managers from USAF, sister services, and other DoD agencies to allocate seats in all

classes assuring priority to AFSOC and other SOF personnel. Just like other divisions and departments, the great work produced this year by this dedicated team helped to ensure USAFSOS is the place students want to come back to for more education—and some do!

LEARNING MANAGEMENT DIVISION

Another key to the squadron's great success is our Blackboard (Bb) Learning Management System (LMS) Division. Our LMS function perhaps hit its most significant evolution in AY23. Led by Mrs. Janice Walker alongside with our Assistant Administrator Mrs. Loree Arrington, facilitated a much-needed upgrade to our LMS system from Blackboard Original to Blackboard Ultra. Through their diligent work and problem-solving skills, they were able to integrate Bb LMS and Genius Student Information System (SIS) software in a way that has enhanced the user experience and navigation within the LMS. Our unique capability offers a full spectrum of the student experience, from enrollment through graduation, and delivering transcripts and certificates.

All USAFSOS courses are facilitated through the SIS with 24/7 access to formal course iterations. The SIS further assists instructors and registrar personnel with automated student reminders, template e-mails, inte-



grated reporting service subscriptions, and much more. As web-based platforms, the LMS and SIS work seamlessly together to provide optimum system availability for students and staff regardless of location or device. In a matter of three short months, Janice and Loree devised a plan, tested, and executed the new system upgrade from Blackboard Original to Blackboard Ultra. With this upgrade, USAFSOS has improved its system capabilities, user experience, and is moving toward the redesign of its courses to continue to deliver the best online experience.

The LMS team works closely with the cyber operations team to ensure our system capabilities are functional

and accessible on the Air Force network. We are continuously testing new capabilities that are offered to our cadre which will further enhance the quality of instruction and content being presented to USAFSOS students. Through teamwork and countless hours of collaboration, our LMS function continues to be at the tip of the spear!

THE DESIGN SHOP

The USAFSOS' graphics team, known as "The Design Shop", provides in-house support to the entire school-house and is responsible for creating and designing visual materials of all types, from creation to production. The Design shop is responsible for maintaining the integrity of the school's "brand."



Mr. Jeff Pendleton brings decades of graphic design, advertising, and commercial art direction experience to the team. The Design Shop shares Mr. Matt Dunne with the ISD team. Matt's expertise in digital and print media gives The Design Shop a real depth and breadth of skill.

Jeff and Matt are capable of turnkey production of logos, promotional themes, illustration products, photography, conventional graphics and multi-media products. They regularly work with base Public Affairs offices and outside promotional and production entities to get the USAFSOS message out to customers. By being in-house, The Design shop is able to keep its finger on the pulse of the school and provide timely support to every course and instructor.

Instructional Systems Design Team

Instructional Systems Design

AFSOC requires a cognitively diverse force that can spark innovation and leverage problem-solving techniques to adapt and thrive in uncertainty. To meet this need, USAFSOS creates professional and operational education that improves Air Commandos' performance across the cognitive, affective, and social learning domains. The school's Instructional Systems

Design (ISD) team believes that education goes beyond imparting knowledge; it is a transformative journey that fosters analytical thought and competent behaviors, transferring learning from the classroom to the operational environment. ISD aims to support the educational process through planning and analysis, course design and development, instructional delivery support, and evaluating student learning and organizational results. Throughout the year, the team provided courseware support to USAFSOS' Academics Department by addressing emerging needs with instruction, implementing the Instructor Development and Certification Program, integrating new technologies into the classroom, and refining instructional design practices to align with operational military education requirements.

Implementation of the Instructor Development and Certification Program

USAFSOS firmly believes in continuous growth and reflection, acknowledging that education is an evolving process for students and educators. Therefore, the school is dedicated to continuous improvement and regularly reflects on its academic practices to provide its students with optimal learning experiences. Cadre development is at the forefront of this effort and is framed by the USAFSOS Instructor Development and Certification Program, updated earlier this year. The phased program outlines structured education, training, and professional development requirements. The ISD team supports the program's initial and mission qualification phases and designs and delivers quarterly workshops that aim to improve instructors' performance. Based on performance trends across instructor evaluations and student feedback, workshop topics recently addressed effective questioning techniques to promote inclusion, engagement, collaboration, and classroom management.

Technology Integration

Project 9 Studio produces audio and visual components in support of student learning at the highest levels. The studio space is outfitted with technologies to support live-streaming capabilities, providing synchronous instruction for a more dynamic student experience—state-of-the-art multimedia production results in professional products centrally branded and exclusive

to the school. The studio's contemporary podcasting arrangement permits the producing, recording, and editing of engaging conversations surrounding topics central to AFSOC. The Project 9 Studio team recently recorded a podcast series for the Warfighting and Leadership Department.

The Introduction to Special Operations Course (ISOC), formerly known as the Air Commando Indoctrination Course (ACINDOC-RL), continues to evolve to meet student needs. While the current online course is delivered monthly to the Command, a separate version of the course is being developed using a contemporary, learner-centric interface, which will improve navigation and accessibility. The course redesign also includes building a collaborative virtual classroom that leverages instructor and peer review, moderation, and feedback. The predominately asynchronous course utilizes online discussions and student reflections to evaluate student progress, which are valuable yet time-consuming techniques. To supplement the instructor's necessary review and moderation of student inputs and to deliver formative feedback to the students, the ISD team

integrated artificial intelligence (AI) in conjunction with a rubric as an instructor support tool. To mitigate data and privacy risks, AI use is limited to assessing mastery of fundamental concepts rather than operationally specific information. Technology integration allows the instructor to effectively teach students in a resource-constrained environment.

In addition to ISOC, the ISD team supports technology integration in other online courses, blended, and in-residence instruction. The design of computer-based training modules was recently improved. Navigation and accessibility functions were incorporated to increase student engagement and knowledge retention, and design standards were captured in an Adobe Captivate style guide.

Instructional Design for Operational Military Education

Active learning increases the generalization of learned concepts and skills to training, exercises, and downrange. An operational-level war gaming event was conceptualized and introduced to support each Special Operations Task Group course iteration. The immersive activity encapsulates myriad dilemmas and tradeoffs characteristically faced by military decision-makers who respond to the consequences of their decisions in real-time. This event provides students valuable decision-making information and experiences applicable to real-world situations in uncertain and time-constrained environments, often with limited resources. Active learning strategies are also incorporated into the Staff

Action Officer course. Students complete a phased project that introduces essential tools and practices and requires the development of several staff products for peer and mentor feedback.

Social interactions also play a pivotal role in a student's educational journey. The ISD team prioritizes student-centered learning, recognizing students as active participants in the learning process. Instruction is designed to meet students' needs, interests, and strengths to create a sense of ownership and agency in their professional development. One course incorporated a museum-based scavenger hunt focused on aviation enterprise history and its global impact. Students with varied experiences combined their knowledge to achieve a common goal.

USAFSOS is invested in offering classroom experiences that merge theory and practice. The team designs activities where students can practice using new knowledge and skills in a controlled environment. Modifying situational variables within the activity promotes adaptability, problem-solving, and critical thinking. This strategy also increases the likelihood that students will be able to generalize information to a new context and transfer learning from the classroom to the operational environment. For example, the newly developed capstone activity for the Building Partnerships for Aviation Capacity seminar more closely aligns with the intended outcome and aims to facilitate collaborative work with foreign partners.





USAFSOS instructional systems designers develop products that create opportunities for engagement and support learning. The instructional design team supports the USAFSOS with extensive experience in military training as well as foundational and higher education. Together, the team offers a distinct skill set to provide solutions at each stage of the ADDIE (Analysis, Design, Development, Implementation, and Evaluation) process. Specializations include human performance improvement, instructional design, classroom instruction, performance technology, multimedia design, change and project management, and program evaluation.

Jessica Leitheiser, Instructional Systems Designer, USAFSOS Courseware Team Lead. Ms. Leitheiser designed and developed education and training programs for DoD/DHS clients since 2015. She is a doctoral candidate for the University of West Florida's Instructional Performance and Technology program and earned degrees in Instructional Technology and Management.

Ms. Hromyak brings varied instructional experience to USAFSOS as a Navy veteran who taught Aviation Water Survival Training to Navy/Marine Corps aircrew and elementary education in the public school system. 

Advanced SOF Concepts Department

Prior to assuming the role of Dean, Mr. Grub served as the Warfighting & Leadership Department Chair, USAFSOS from 2016 to 2019. Mr. Grub's other major assignments during his 24-year Air Force career included: Air Force Special Operations Air Warfare Center Deputy Director for the Training/Education Directorate and Director of Irregular Warfare Plans, USAFSOS Vice Commandant, Deputy Commander of the 1st Special Operations Group, and HQ AFSOC Chief of Weapons and Tactics.

Mr. Grub led four deployments from 2008 to 2014 as a Combat Aviation Advisor (#449), Mi-17/Mi-171 Instructor Pilot to Yemen and Afghanistan where he developed partner nation counterterrorism vertical lift combat capability. As an MH-53J/M Pave Low evaluator pilot (#318) he joined AFSOC in 1998 and soon deployed to Operations ALLIED FORCE, SOUTHERN

WATCH, and ENDURING FREEDOM in 2001, and IRAQI FREEDOM, where he was part of TF Viking liberating northern Iraq during the first of his three Iraq tours.

Mr. Grub holds a Bachelor of Science in Military History from the Air Force Academy and a Master of Arts in Military Arts & Science: Unconventional Warfare from American Military University. Thoughts from the Dean

Following up on last year's reflections on who we are (our values and ideas), this year's focus is on the major themes which surround our course design and our efforts to map the SOF education for life curriculum. The institutionalization of the Air Force's Force Generation Cycle (AFFORGEN) drove USAFSOS battle rhythm in terms of course design and execution. The new force presentation modules of SOTU and SOTG continued to mature and, in turn, refine the target audience for operational force development. Concurrently, USAFSOS faculty needed to advance professional development courses (leadership) to keep thematic and sequential pace with operational curriculum. This was, without doubt, a challenging endeavor.

The two major themes USAFSOS promoted this past year were advancing joint literacy in AFSOC and maturing the concept of homophily as important to the SOF viewpoint. Homophily is the study of how "us vs. them" groups identify and interact. As applied to AFSOC's efforts within the HAF and USSOCOM there is no "them," there is only "Us." In this context Homophily means the only "them" is the enemy and whether you are a retired helicopter pilot, a Talon II loadmaster, a dental technician, or an SEL for a Mission Sustainment Team, you are part of "Us." This concept translates to AFSCs, staff directorates, SOF components, USAF MAJCOMs, etc. Us. This entire diverse and exceptional team is Us. The "them" are those that oppose our nation and seek to do "Us" harm. Secondly, the major joint literacy focus was on getting AFSOC to embrace joint planning. A full court press effort was made to teach the Joint Planning Process to as many Air Commandos as possible. Joint Planning Process was taught over the Army's MDMP for two reasons. First, within the concept of "mission command", AFSOF should be "initiating planning", not just "receiving the mission." The second and more important point is one of "cultural wallpaper." The Army and those who support the Army do MDMP, equal joint partners acting as peers do JPP. AFSOC must grow culturally to the point where our leaders aren't merely leading other Airmen, our AFSOC leaders must grow to be credible joint leaders leading joint teams. This is WAY outside the comfort zone of most, but something that over time we must build as a culture. This starts with Air Commandos first coming into AFSOC and continues as Air Commandos progress throughout their careers eventually taking leadership roles in wing and joint task force organizations. A daunting challenge, but a worthy endeavor. When called, we will fight with the AFSOC we have, concurrently we will ready the AFSOC we need to shape, deter, and conquer the challenges and enemies which will inevitably confront America's future.

Director, Institutional Effectiveness



Individual Branch



Introduction to Special Operations

Course Code: ISOC-RL PDS Code: 35K

Length: 3 Days in length starting AY24 Total Course Hours: 18

ISOC replaces the Air Commando Introduction Academics Course for FY24.


Course Description: The curriculum for this course started off as Introduction to Special Operations Course (ISOC) in 1990. ACINDOC-RL was an integration of Introduction to Special Operations and Intercultural Competencies. Combined, ACINDOC-RL satisfied all requirements for either course. This course was designed to educate and familiarize students with Air Force Special Operation Command (AFSOC), its mission, and its proud heritage beginning with the First Air Commando Group. It also focused on the organizational components and missions of US Special Operations Command (USSOCOM), with origins dating back to WWII. Embedded within this historical context is the cultural competencies necessary to conducting Special Operations tasks for US National Defense Strategy objectives. This course provided building blocks to progress one's foundational professional military knowledge while enhancing credibility when working and interacting with joint SOF partners.


The course ran for 21 days and consisted of four modules, each module designed to be completed sequentially, including the pre-test, self-guided lessons, live Collaborate session lessons, and post-test with the end of course critique. Students found that the first nine days of the course offer flexibility to complete lessons at a self-guided pace. There were roughly 18 hours allocated for independent learning.

Target Audience: ACINDOC was designed for newly assigned personnel (within 6 months of arrival) to AFSOC. It is also designed for other personnel in a position requiring knowledge of joint US Special Operations. The course was available to all others on a space available basis.

ISOC is a remote learning course for newly assigned AFSOC personnel to quickly and accurately comprehend, then appropriately and effectively act, in culturally complex environments. The course introduces the history which led to the creation of USSOCOM and AFSOC, and explores the key concepts of special operations, irregular warfare, and AFSOC mission areas, aircraft, and special tactics.

Flight Leadership Course

Course Code: FLC PDS Code: 532 PDS Code: 532 Length: 5 Days (3 Days in length starting AY24) Total Course Hours: 35

Course Description: The AFSOC Flight Leadership Course (FLC) was first established in 2018 to answer the Air Force's call to develop a command FLC to meet the challenges of flight leadership. FLC is an educational and mentorship- based course designed to proactively develop AFSOC's unit-level flight leadership teams into fully effective leaders. The course covers how to effectively lead, develop, include, and enable flight members, how to receive orders and intent to plan and coordinate internally and externally for mission success, an understanding of stewardship and accountability with managing resources, and a hands-on dive into improving the unit at a deliberately accelerated pace. Students participate in instructor and student-led discussions, solve scenario-based challenges, and develop an Initial Action Plan in support of their role as a Flight Leader.


Target Audience: All students will accomplish this course prior to assuming flight leadership duties; unit leaders should proactively work with their wing-level leadership to schedule their members. Ideally, this course will be followed up by a wing-led event that builds upon this course and trains

members on local procedures, priorities, working with functional and key staff networks, etc. This is a nominative USAFSOS course and attendees must be submitted by their chain of command and approved at the wing or group (O-6) level.

Capt Thomas Yarbrough, FLC Course Director

Capt Yarbrough is a Combat Systems Officer and flew on the U-28A with the 319th SOS at Hurlburt Field from 2016-2023. He also served as a Flight Commander and Assistant Operations Officer (ADO) for the 25th Intelligence Squadron at Hurlburt Field from 2020-2023. Capt Yarbrough's knowledge on flight leadership came to fruition via his years as a Flight Commander for the Operations, Plans/Exercises, Readiness, and SARM flights. He has won several leadership awards and later became the Assistant Operations Officer, overseeing more than 10 flights and mentoring several first-time flight commanders/chiefs. Capt Yarbrough serves as the Leadership Division Chief at USAF Special Operations School and has been teaching the Flight Leadership course since May 2023.

Length: 10 Days Total Course Hours: 45



Students will engage in activities that promote problem-solving methodologies and professional networking.


Target Audience: The course is intended for officers, enlisted, and civilians within the first three months of their staff assignment.


Capt Brittnie Davis, STAFFAO Course Director

Course Code: LDRDEV PDS Code: 2HX

Length: 5 Days Total Course Hours: 30 Course will not be offered in FY24.

Course Description: Initially titled Air Commando Officer Development Course (ACODC) when developed in 2015. Today's Leadership Development is a 5-day educational course that has four modular areas of instruction. The first module lays out the strategic vision and mission of AFSOC while emphasizing the role of today's Airmen in leading current and future Special Operations Forces. The second module explores the legal, administrative, and financial responsibilities of SOF leaders within SOCOM organizations, providing students with a functional understanding of what resources are available. The third module is devoted to specialized topics, including the importance of Total Force Integration (TFI). In the fourth module, the students engage in an in-class exercise employing different leadership scenarios that examine legal and ethical issues in real-world simulated situations.


LDRDEV has temporarily been put on hold in FY24 to support competing course requirements.

Length: 5 Days (3 Days in length starting AY24) Total Course Hours: 36




Unit Branch

Students are instructed on the value of building tactical credibility and joint fluency, and how these skills impact communication with leadership. The curriculum outlines the duties and responsibilities of the AFSOC SOTU and accounts for the variances between deployed and off-station environments. SOTU explores the challenges of standing up an operation or integrating into an established infrastructure.

Target Audience: Special Operations Task Unit (SOTU) course is designed for Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC) personnel who have been selected for or have the potential to serve as a mission commander or Senior Enlisted Leader for a SOTU.

Prerequisite: Students are required to graduate from the ISOC course prior to taking the SOTU course. Individual waivers may be granted by the Course Director on a case-by-case basis.


Mr. Corby Martin, SOTU Course Facilitator




Mr. Chris Palmer, SOTU 191 Course Facilitator

Special Operations Task Group (SOTG-191)

The SOTG Course is a ten-day, in-residence course that aims to develop the core competencies required of a SOTG construct to lead organic forces and integrate AFSOF multi-domain capabilities into JTF operations. Students learn how to exercise command and control (C2) in a multidomain, joint environment. The curriculum explores strategic guidance, warfighting functions and joint planning through the lens of a warfighting staff.

Target Audience: The Special Operations Task Group course is designed for AFSOC personnel and aims to develop the core competencies and attributes required of SOTG leaders.

Prerequisite: Students are required to graduate from the USAFSOS W119 Air Command Indoctrination course prior to taking the W341 SOTG course. Individual waivers may be granted by the Course Director on a case-by-case basis.


Capt Nate Baldwin, SOTG 191 Course Director



Cross Cultural Engagement (SOTU-AP 291)

Course Code: SOTU-AP 291 PDS Code: 35F Length: 5 Days Total Course Hours: 31

Course Description: SOTU-AP 291 is a 5-day face-to-face course that builds general knowledge and skills to quickly comprehend, then appropriately act, in a culturally complex environment to achieve desired effects. Students learn about academic frameworks that help AFSOC members to recognize their own cultural preferences and to compare them with global variations. This course teaches students how to conduct specific research into culture attributes of a given country or region. Specific focus is placed on identifying common tensions in intercultural communications and how those tensions are manifested in the continuum of conflict environment encountered by military members. Finally, students learn and practice communication and negotiation skills for mitigating the differences in a variety of scenarios.

Target Audience: Special Ops personnel who will be engaging in face-to-face interactions with international personnel as part of their duties. This includes but is not limited to: Foreign Internal Defense, Irregular Warfare UTC medical personnel, bilateral/multilateral exercise mission planners, Non-Standard Aviation, Civil Affairs, Military Information Support Operations, and Foreign Military Sales. This course is especially constructed for person-

nel who anticipate going, but have not yet gone, on a deployment that requires this type of interaction. Other government personnel who anticipate working or training with international personnel will also benefit.






Maj. Guinevere Bernard, Engagement Course Director

NEGOTIATIONS FOR AFSOF (SOTU-AP 391)

Course Code: SOTU-AP 391 PDS Code: 35F Length: 3 Days Total Course Hours: 31

Course Description: The Negotiations for AFSOF course is designed to create negotiation skills required of AFSOC operators in culturally complex environments that are characterized by varying degrees of open or potential conflict. Focus is on the creation of frameworks for interaction that acknowledge the effects of stress due to physical and emotional factors. Students examine the military context in which negotiations must occur. To demonstrate learning of the concepts, students participate in multiple practical exercises in different scenarios.

Target Audience: This course is for the AFSOC member who will engage with others at the joint, combined, and interagency levels to support AFSOC missions and TSOC objectives. The course will benefit SOF who routinely work with others outside of their chain of command or who are involved in security cooperation or security force assistance.


Course Prerequisites: Each AFSOC student must complete USAFSOS ISOC-RL and Cross Cultural Engagements courses prior to attendance.





SOF Anti-Terrorism Level 2 (SOF-AT2)

Course Code: SOFAT2 PDS Code: 2H8 Length: 5 Days Total Course Hours: 40

Course Description: SOF Antiterrorism Level 2 is a 5-day course that certifies antiterrorism officers (ATOs) through a scenario-based curriculum designed to prepare special operations forces conducting irregular warfare activities in uncertain and hostile contingency environments. SOF-AT2 develops the ATO to advise a commander on antiterrorism and mission assurance though incremental risk analyses, hands-on technical demonstrations, course-of-action development, and field exercises. SOF-AT2 supports Non-Standard Aviation (NSAv), Mission Sustainment Team (MST), and Deployed Aircraft Ground Response Element (DAGRE) pipeline training requirements as a USAF-approved Antiterrorism Level II certification course compliant with DoD Instruction O-2000.16, Volume 1.


Target Audience: Military officers (O-1 to O-4), enlisted (E-5 to E-8), US Government civilian employees designated by the commander to perform Antiterrorism duties, and other individuals involved in or supporting AT/ Force Protection programs. SOFAT2 is a nominative course. Students are


selected on an individual basis and notified of their selection by the course director. Selections are made approximately 4 weeks prior to the course start date. AFSOC and other SOF nominees are given priority, with other personnel accepted as space is available.

Mr Richard Reddecliff, SOFAT2 Course Director

Mr. Reddecliff is a retired AFOSI special agent. In OSI he commanded Detachment 241 (Provisional) at Dhahran, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia; Det 212 at Shaw AFB, South Carolina; and Det 518 at Spangdahlem AB, Germany. He also directed the Dynamics of International Terrorism course for AFSOC from 1999 to 2002, and following the events of 9/11 he was reassigned as the OSI Counterterrorism Liaison Officer to the National Security Agency. Force Protection for Air Commandos (FPAC-291)

Course Code: FPAC-291 PDS Code: 35N

Length: 5 Days in length starting AY24 Total Course Hours: 31

Course Description: The Force Protection for Air Commandos a 5-day course that examines the organizations, motivations, and capabilities of terrorism, and the means by which the United States and SOF combat terrorism. FPAC revisits a continuing theme throughout the week, emphasizing protective measures that US government personnel and their families can employ to minimize the risks posed by terrorism, highlighted by personal accounts given by individuals directly affected by terrorism.

Target Audience: AFSOF deployers in any phase prior to COMMIT (Unit or collective preferred). Identified MST/SOTU/SOTG/JTF in AFFORGEN and other USAF/SOF/DOD/USG & allies/partners.






Capt Kyle "GOMR" Bushey, F-PAC Course Director

DIT FY 21-23 Student Demographics & Iterations







Joint/Collective Branch

The Joint/Collective branch provides Air Commandos with integrated Force Element Development. Initial 300 level training will integrate UTCs from the same SOTG to achieve training objectives. The entire SOTG builds proficiency in generating effects, integrates in AOR campaign plans. Joint/Collective branch prioritizes highend joint training with theater partners. Two flights are in this branch, Campaigning and Security Cooperations. Campaigning offers the 300 level theater courses and SOTG-391. Security Cooperation offers the Building Partnership Aviation Capacity Seminar (BPACS).

Joint/Collective Branch ADO, Major Matt "BAIN" Garvey

Major Garvey is a EUCOM Foreign Area Officer and F-15E Strike Eagle Weapons System Officer. He graduated from Northern Arizona University in 2010, majoring in Anthropology and a minor in Mandarin Chinese. Maj Garvey went on to complete the F-15E Basic Course at Seymour Johnson AFB and reported to his first duty station at RAF Lakenheath in 2013. This course focuses on the creation of regional and cultural understanding that will enable SOF personnel to operate more effectively within AFRICOM. This course deliberately aligns its topic selections with applicable AFSOC, Special Operations Command Africa (SOCAF), U.S. Africa Command (USAFRICOM), US Special Operations Command (USSOCOM), and relevant Headquarters United States Air Force (HAF) guidance, plans and operations to place tactical-level core SOF mission areas into operational and strategic contexts. The course covers the political, military, social, and economic factors that have historically influenced operations in AFRICOM.



Course Code: AFRICOM-231 PDS Code: 35T Length: 5 Days Total Course Hours: 33





Course Code: SONOCOM-170 PDS Code: 2B4 Length: 4 Days (Remote) Total Course Hours: 24






SSgt Seth Clement, SOUTHCOM Course Director

Course Code: SOUTHCOM-271 PDS Code: 35E Length: 5 Days Total Course Hours: 32






Maj Shimon Perez-Conde, SOUTHCOM Course Director



Course Description: Originally featured at USAFSOS in 1988 as the Southeast Asia Orientation Course (SEAOC), INDOPACOM Operations 211 (INDOPACOM-211) is a classified course that extends over 5 days, offering an advanced exploration of the United States Indo-Pacific Command (USINDOPACOM) Area of Responsibility (AOR). INDOPACOM-211 focuses on US strategic interests in the Asia-Pacific region with emphasis placed upon items of greatest interest to US Special Operations Forces (SOF) and Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC). Building upon the foundation of INDOPACOM Orientation 110, the course addresses the socio-economic, cultural, political, historical, and security dynamics that influence SOF operations in support of USINDOPACOM's Theater Campaign Plan. Students are also exposed to other subjects of interest to the US government including terrorist activities, transnational crime, and regional organizations in Northeast, Southeast, and South Asia. Special emphasis




Mr. Mike Colangelo, CENTCOM Course Director



EUCOM-100 integrates these concepts with current strategies from AFSOC, SOCEUR, USEUCOM, USSOCOM, and USAF, placing tactical-level core SOF mission areas into operational and strategic contexts. The course covers political, military, social, and economic factors in USEUCOM, including the implications of the 2020 USSOCOM Comprehensive Review and the Future AFSOF C2 CONOP. It provides an introductory framework on organizational compe-


tencies, joint functions, and multi-domain operations that are vital for effective SOF engagement in the region.




Ms. Jaime Nowack, EUCOM Course Director


Target Audience: Designed for Special Operations Forces (SOF) personnel actively engaged or soon to be deployed to the Russia/Eurasia region,



Building Partnership Aviation Capacity Seminar (BPACS S311)

Course Code: BPACS S311 PDS Code: 2G6 (Spanish Version: 1DK)
Length: 10 Days Total Course Hours: 73

Course Description: BPACS is designed to educate US SOF and partner nation (PN) aviation experts on the core attributes of Aviation Enterprise Development (AED) as they relate to national security strategy formulation and execution. The seminar aims to expand AED through a purposely built network with our allies and partners to optimize aviation interoperability, integration, and collaboration. BPACS builds understanding through collaborative learning about mutual AED needs and capacities, and exposes unique attributes of aviation capacities that contribute to effective internal and external national security goal achievement. The BPACS uses classroom discussions guided by US Department of Defense personnel, experts from other Government agencies (OGA), university professors, and other experienced military and civilian practitioners; as well as practical exercises, country presentations, and field studies/trips to achieve seminar education

objectives. Topics are presented in a seminar format to encourage collaborative learning. BPACS schedule includes social and hospitality events during and after normal duty hours to encourage rapport building and create long term relationships.

End state: Create a global network of interoperable, high trained, special operations aviation partners, capable of creating a joint effect to prevent adversaries from doing future harm. In concert with the United States 2022 National Defense Strategy Guidance, the primary goal of the BPACS is to strengthen allies and partners while attracting new partners through purposeful aviation partnership as well as reinvigorate and modernize our alliances and partnership around the world. National Security Aviation topics and activities are selected to create opportunities that build mutual respect, facilitate regional consultative mechanisms, and deepen Special Operations Forces (SOF) aviation interoperability.

Target Audience: The BPACS goal is to bring Partner Nation military and civilian personnel together with US military members and civilians to build trust and partnership as they work to build a shared, practical vision for the Partner Nation's aviation resource development. Participants that will be considered for nomination for seminar participation: Mid- to Senior-Level Partner Nation Personnel from E-IMET eligible countries, and US civilians and military (O-4 to O-6 / Civilian equivalent) with a present or future role in Partner Nation-US aviation contacts. Personnel should have a present or future role in aviation acquisition, training, operations, resource planning, or resource management.

Capt Sarah Biro, BPACS Course Director

Captain Biro is originally from Cleveland, Ohio, and entered the Air Force in August 2016 through Officer Training School at Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama. She completed intelligence officer training in July 2017, and since then has held a variety of intelligence positions related to intelligence support to air operations. She currently serves as an intelligence officer conducting Building Partner Capacity endeavors through USAFSOS and is a formally trained Spanish speaker. As an intelligence officer, Capt Biro supported Close Air Support, Combat Search and Rescue, and non-traditional ISR missions with the 75th Fighter Squadron, to include a combat deployment in support of Operation ENDURING FREEDOM. She was also the Chief of Intelligence Training at the 23d OSS at Moody Air Force Base, Georgia, where she trained and mentored junior analysts on A-10 mission sets and support to operations. 





Mr. Shawn Swift, BPACS Course Director

Language Training Detachment

The ARMY's Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center's (DLIFLC) Language Training Detachment (LTD) is an integral part of the USAFSOS educational enterprise. This talented and diverse team consisting of a Site Director and 12 language professors continues to lead the way in world class foreign language education, tailored specifically for AFSOC personnel and affiliated units.

The LTD continuously works in sync with all departments of the USAFSOS team to ensure synergy between language, culture, and regional expertise across the spectrum of USAFSOS educational programs. The languages offered by the LTD in FY23 included: Arabic, Dari, Farsi, French, Spanish, Russian, Tagalog, and Thai.

To meet the ever-changing operational needs of AFSOC, the LTD develops courses for airmen with a wide range of culturally-based global language proficiency. From Pre-Deployment courses, where the students learn the basics of the regional-specific elements of language and culture to SETs and advanced courses, where they enhance their current levels of proficiency and cultural knowledge. The LTD students continuously meet and exceed the diverse requirements of the AFSOC to ensure mission success.

This year the LTD delivered a great variety of courses to include: Modular Initial Acquisition Training (IAT), Sustainment and Enhancement Training, Significant Language Training Events (SLTE), LEAP-ACE, and Pre-Deployment Training. The language professors tailor





all courses to meet the operational requirements of the AFSOC. In addition to teaching, they supported multiple iterations of CULEX operational scenarios with 371 SOCTS, a plethora of operational scenarios for USAFSOS Theater Engagement Courses (BPACS, ENGAGE, EUCOM), and received notes of appreciation from the USAFSOS Commandant and Course Directors. In 2023, in addition to traditional set of courses, the LTD in collaboration with AFCLC/Maxwell and USAFSOS developed and delivered first iteration of advanced level LEAP-ACE courses for Thai, Tagalog, Spanish, French, and Russian LEAP scholars.

The Air Force Culture and Language Center has partnered with the United States Air Force Special Operations School to leverage their "Intercultural Skills for Engagement (ENGAGE)" course and instruction via Defense Language Institute Language Training Detachment to create a first-of-its kind Language Intensive Training Event for LEAP scholars. The central theme of this course is preparing multi-capable Airmen for Agile Combat Employment (ACE).

LEAP-ACE courses aimed at developing a cadre of advanced language proficiency LEAP scholars in a target strategic language to utilize their skills and experiences for ACE-focused assignments, deployments, and TDYs.

LEAP scholars participated in a week of ENGAGE, followed by two weeks of operationally-focused Advanced language and culture studies, off-sites, utilizing cultural knowledge in the local area, projects, research, technical vocabulary, and MTT-prep role play with ACE, interoperability, and adversary understanding as underlying themes.



Language Training Detachment Student Throughput




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MOBILE EDUCATION EVENTS FOR AY23

Mobile Education Events (MEES) continued to provide a unique high demand instructional asset to USAFSOS. Its capability to deliver customized operational military education and deployed cultural and language expertise at locations worldwide maximized AFSOC and SOF mission success. MEE instructors include both in-house USAFSOS cadre and expert guest lecturers. Instructors adapt existing lessons and create new lessons in order to deliver focused operational military education. MEEs range in duration from several hours to several days and are delivered locally and at locations worldwide. The primary target audience is AFSOC and other SOF units.

USSOCOM, USAF, and US Government agencies collaborate with USAFSOS to customize 36 events from a 1-3 day MEE event for special operations forces and pre-deployment events. Impressively, USAFSOS educated 1,928 members with customized pre-deployment MEEs for AFSOC units in AY23.


STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS




TARGET POPULATION
