LOCATION

The United States Air Force Special Operations School (USAFSOS) is located at Hurlburt Field on northwest Florida's Gulf Coast, five miles west of Fort Walton Beach. It is collocated with the 492d Special Operations Wing in The Alison Building (Bldg 90503, 357 Tully Street), one block east of the Hurlburt Field Lodging Office.



HERITAGE

USAFSOS is the product of a 50 year evolutionary process. In March 1961, President John F. Kennedy, responding to Chairman Nikita S. Khruschev's clarion call for "wars of national liberation," cited the need for countering "subversion and guerrilla warfare" that were the heart of Communist insurgency. As a result, the Air Force increased the emphasis given to special air warfare training. The United States Air Force Special Air Warfare School (USAFSAWS) was originally a Directorate of the 4410th Combat Crew Training Wing at Hurlburt Field. In 1968, the school was redesignated USAFSOS. In June 1987, USAFSOS, as an organizational element of the 23d Air Force. was assigned to the US Special Operations Command (USSOCOM), headquartered at MacDill AFB, FL. In May 1990, the school became a direct reporting unit of the newly established Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC). In October 2008, with the standup of the Air Force Special Operations Training Center, USAFSOS was placed under that unit, which was later reorganized on 11 February 2013 and renamed the Air Force Special Operations Air Warfare Center. Most recently, USAFSOS aligned to the 492d Special Operations Wing. During its formative years, the school's main thrust was the preparation of Air Force personnel for duty in Southeast Asia. Subsequently, USAFSOS has grown from teaching a single course the first year, to conducting 118 iterations of 26 unique formal courses and 13 customized, Mobile Education Events (MEEs) in AY20. USAFSOS currently provides SOF indoctrination, as well as political, military, and cultural studies supporting SOF operations in the various combatant theaters. The school also provides language training, specialized instructions on irregular warfare principles, building partner nation aviation capacity, aviation foreign internal defense, dynamics of international terrorism, command, control, integration of Air Force Special Operation Forces (AFSOF) assets, and AFSOC leadership development.

USAFSOS Spiral of Expertise Principle

The "Spiral of Expertise" model illustrates the levels of educational support USAFSOS provides to AFSOC that, when coupled with training and field experience throughout SOF careers, builds an ever increasing operational capability. The mission of USAFSOS is to deliver United States Special Operations Command's and Air Force's education strategy through professional development, operational military education, and language training. USAFSOS develops and conducts resident and offstation joint, interagency, and multinational special operations courses with focus areas in command and control, language, cultural and geopolitical regional orientation, security cooperation, antiterrorism, and irregular warfare to ensure operational readiness of special operations forces.

OPERATIONAL MILITARY EDUCATION

USAFSOS provides Operational Military Education (OME) curricula that instill USSOCOM personnel with expertise thus enabling operators to better perform their unique mission sets. The OME curricula are delivered through courses tailored to the unit's mission and theater of engagement.

ACADEMIC YEAR 2020 HIGHLIGHTS & ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In its 53rd year of operation, USAFSOS continued to refine its curriculum to provide relevant and responsive OME support to the SOF warrior.

Several profound organizational and educational changes occurred in AY20. Specific details on AY20 changes, events, and accomplishments follow with each department highlighting its respective achievements.

SUPPORTINE DEPARTMENT





Support Department Chair



The Support Department is chaired by Mr. Bob Love who provides direction for 12 civilians, 5 military members, and 4 contractors. The department is the backbone of the school reaching all aspects of education and instruction. The department is responsible for the execution of administration, cyber operations, security, facility management, student and guest speaker support, resource management, audiovisual, graphics, video teleconferencing, registrar functions and new in AY20, Blackboard Learning Management System. Also, new in AY20, Major Johnny Smith realigned from the Theater Engagement Department to serve as the Support Department Deputy, which has proved beneficial across the squadron.

The dedicated audiovisual specialists provide classified and nonclassified multimedia and the associated software, hardware, and presentation systems for the school's auditoriums, classrooms, and conference rooms in order to carry out its mission. The team of five, lead by Mr. David Cagle, were extremely instrumental in the COVID19 Remote Learning and resident education success stories which literally spanned the globe. The dedication of this team was noticed from the very moment USAFSOS was deemed mission essential in March 2020 and continues today with the only difference of service being the mandated social distancing protocols.

USAFSOS classrooms feature fully upgraded digital systems, secure and nonsecure video teleconference (VTC) systems, classroom recording, and video editing to support course iterations. The audiovisual division is also capable of providing presentation systems from legacy to present-day technology. The addition of two dedicated breakout rooms in AY20, specifically named Gnome Rooms 1 and 2, to honor the AV team, have proved to be a great success as the additional space has been utilized greatly during this pandemic.


The always on-the-go four cyber operations division team members, lead by Mr. Robert Buckman, not only provided daytoday computer support for faculty members, but students alike. From desktop support, to remedying ticket resolution, to issuing properly configured student laptops, to ensuring all DoD and subordinate cyber guidance is fully adhered to. USAFSOS would not function as smoothly as it does without their dedication, which was tested and proven solid during the pandemic with massive teleworking and remote learning capabilities being fortified.

In AY20, the student support division saw a change of leadership with Mrs. Linda Urda retiring and Mrs. Jennifer Stutes coming on board. Jennifer leads a division of five including training management, guest speaker services,

and is responsible for the behind the scene support elements of all USAFSOS classes and Mobile Education Events. Student support performs registrar functions, which include loading/maintaining courses. loading/maintaining class iterations, quota allocation management, and maintaining student statuses in various personnel databases. Just like other divisions and departments, the great work produced this year by this dedicated team helps to ensure USAFSOS is the place students want to come back to further their education.

Guest speaker support provides travel itineraries for guest lecturers and manages honoraria payments to non-DoD speakers. The registrar coordinates with 300 quota managers among USAF,






sister services, and other DoD agencies to allocate seats in all classes assuring priority to AFSOC and other SOF personnel while also prioritizing other MAJCOM, sister services, and DoD agency training needs. The department provided various levels of support to over 3,975 students attending 26 unique courses in AY20.

Another behind the scene stellar performer is Graphic Artist, Ms. Lori Werth. Lori is a team of one and can be counted on for much of the schools art work, both printed and digital. Her dedication always proves successful by providing timely superior artwork for course name changes, mission, and leadership publications as well as various display name plates, plaques, and other top-notch design products not only for USAFSOS, but the 492d SOW as well. Lori is also the schools longest tenured volunteer as a member of the Dynamics of International Terrorism (DIT) shooting demonstration team.

Blackboard Learning Management System

The Blackboard (Bb) Learning Management System (LMS) function moved under the Support Department to better align with Student Services functions. It secured an additional position in the Fall of 2020, and completely transitioned the USAFSOS learning environment to unprecedented heights in AY20. Under the leadership of Mrs. Cynthia Crouch, USAFSOS Bb Administrator, continual optimization and use of Bb LMS and integrated Genius Student Information System (SIS) software remained key enablers of USAFSOS global classrooms. This unique capability offers a full spectrum student experience, from enrollment into the classroom through graduation, and delivering transcripts. All USAFSOS courses are facilitated through the SIS with 24/7 access to formal course iterations. The SIS further assists instructors and registrar personnel with automated student reminders, template emails, integrated reporting service subscriptions, and much more. As web-based platforms, the LMS and SIS work seamlessly together to provide optimum system availability for students and staff regardless of location or device. When COVID19 hit, the team went into overdrive to research, purchase, configure, and implement Bb Collaborate Ultra within just a few weeks. The rapid adoption of Collaborate included outside the box thinking as many were transitioning their entire home life environment and learning to take their work home during a global crisis. USAFSOS obtained help from a sister unit to assist with faculty training, new course development, new

course delivery methods using collaborate tools to keep the mission of USAFSOS moving forward. This required near constant communication of defined teams, working nights and weekends, in a dedicated effort toward this singular goal.

The success of the new remote learning environment allowed for continued education while the rest of the world was in lock down and contributed to further growth. The new position brought Ms. Janice Walker, fulltime Bb Assistant, into the fold just in time for more unprecedented successes. USAFSOS also transitioned its LMS to GovCloud and configured Common Access Card (CAC) authentication for over 10,000 accounts, paving the way for USAFSOS to be successful in a remote learning environment which delivers secure content to learners worldwide. Through realignment, position acquisition, and global crisis our LMS function is at the tip of the spear!


Office of the Dean of Academics

Mr. Grub's other major assignments during his 24 year Air Force career included: Air Force Special Operations Air Warfare Center Deputy Director for the Training/Education Directorate and Director of Irregular Warfare Plans, USAFSOS Vice Commandant, Deputy Commander of the 1st Special Operations Group, and HQ AFSOC Chief of Weapons and Tactics.

Mr. Grub led four deployments from 2008 to 2014 as a Combat Aviation Advisor (#449) Mi-17/Mi-171 Instructor Pilot to Yemen and Afghanistan where he developed partner nation counterterrorism vertical lift combat capability. As an MH-53J/M Pave Low evaluator pilot (#318) he joined AFSOC in 1998 and soon deployed to Operations ALLIED FORCE, SOUTHERN WATCH, ENDURING FREEDOM in 2001, and IRAQI FREEDOM, where he was part of TF Viking liberating northern Iraq during the first of his three Iraq tours.

Mr. Grub holds a Bachelor of Science in Military History and a Masters of Arts in Military Arts & Science: Unconventional





Institutional Effectiveness



During AY20, USAFSOS evaluated achievement of course goals and lesson objectives for each course conducted. Using professional observations, verbal feedback, student reaction surveys, and measurements of learning (tests). Course directors also prepared end-of-course reports, which recapped and analyzed all aspects of course conduct. Additionally, Course After Action Review Boards (CAARBs) were conducted for selected courses to highlight student demographics, specific content, and delivery. USAFSOS conducted comprehensive Biennial Course Reviews (BCRs) for three courses with associated documentation, to include the syllabus, lesson objectives, and evaluation instruments. USAFSOS will continue to conduct biennial formal reviews for all its courses and complete required updates to course syllabi and associated lesson plans.

Instructional Design (ID) Team



2020 pandemic imposed manv challenges and required USAFSOS to consider how to best achieve the mission. The need to deliberately develop Air Commandos persisted, and the school quickly answered with an innovative approach to education by upgrading instructional technology and expanding the online campus. The Instructional Systems Design (ISD) team was essential to the analysis, design, development, implementation, and evaluation (ADDIE) of the new methodology. USAFSOS responded to the need with a plan to execute emergency remote learning for the Combat Aviation Advising and Non-Standard Aviation pipeline courses.

The academics component of the pipelines are comprised of multiple rigorous courses. Course curriculum was evaluated and adjusted for delivery via Blackboard. Face-to-face lessons incorporated virtual teaching tools and were redesigned to allow for web lectures and self-study activities. It was a tremendous effort over 200 hours of instruction were redesigned and ready for execution within 5 short weeks.

The emergency response was a full-force effort and required maximizing the use of the school's existing learning management system with the addition of Blackboard Collaborate, a platform which allows faculty to deliver online instruction and students to synchronously work in teams in a virtual classroom. Faculty had to quickly adjust to new technology, and the instructional design and training teams implemented a hands-on training program to ensure the USAFSOS team was prepared to effectively teach with the new tools. USAFSOS' success with remote delivery methods was the catalyst for analysis and redesign of the school's curriculum.

During the spring of AY20, the Warfighting and Leadership Department rebranded the Introduction to Special Operations Course (ISOC) as Air Commando Indoctrination (ACINDOC-RL). The foundational curriculum endured, but it was revised to incorporate elements of cultural competencies as well as a current perspective on ethical behavior. ACINDOC-RL was configured for 100% remote delivery, which allows AFSOC students across multiple installations and time zones to engage with courseware at the same time.



Over the summer, AFSOC's Methods of Instruction Course was redesigned for online delivery. The current offering, Methods of Academic Instruction Course (MOAIC-RL), emphasizes the academic fundamentals of various teaching methodologies and prepares SOF instructors to develop curriculum. The structure allows students to complete self-study lessons over the course of a month, in contrast to the 2 week in-residence course. Synchronous online



sessions provide opportunities for students to discuss coursework with the instructor and receive timely feedback. The new format includes a flexible schedule, accommodating students' needs for training qualifications or professional development.

Throughout the summer and fall of AY20, the ISD team supported the Theater Engagement Department's comprehensive analysis to determine how to educate students about US strategic interests. The result was a tiered program of courses designed to develop regional and cultural understanding to enable SOF personnel to operate more effectively. A Syllabus of Instruction (SOI) for each theater orientation course was drafted and approved for the CENTCOM, AFRICOM,

INDOPACOM, EUCOM, and SONOCOM Areas of Responsibility (AOR). All 100-level orientation courses were optimized for the virtual environment and utilize USAFSOS' suite of virtual tools to create meaningful collaboration in online classrooms. Consequently, the subsequent tier of AOR-specific courses will take a focused approach on operations. The ISD team will help to develop the blended 200 level courses using the flipped classroom model. The courses are scheduled for development in early 2021.

With more coursework occurring outside of the traditional classroom, USAFSOS also adapted their assessment strategy to measure students' progress. Blackboard offers varied measures for analysis, and the ISD team incorporated select tools into each remote learning course.



Most notably, now students complete pre-tests before accessing lessons and post-tests upon completion of the course. Aggregate data is used to support course reviews and identify proficiency in specific areas. Students' pre-test scores are compared with the post-test scores to measure learning. After each iteration, an item analysis is conducted for each course assessment. Item analysis reports provide statistics on overall student performance, test quality, and individual test questions. ISD uses the information to recognize test questions that may be poor discriminators of student performance. In addition to the pre and post-tests, students collaborate on team projects, share ideas across discussion forums, and reflect on learning through written assignments. Opportunity for formative evaluation and feedback are built in to these activities.

Project 9 Studios



Project 9 Studios continues to design, develop, and produce a host of audio and visual components in continued support of the USAFSOS mission of student learning at the highest levels. The studio space is outfitted with technologies to support instructional lecture recording and livestreaming capabilities, providing realtime instructor demonstrations for a more dynamic student experience. State of the art video production results in captivating graphics and professional products, centrally branded and exclusive to the school. The studio's contemporary podcasting arrangement permits the scripting, producing, recording, and editing of a host of informational, engaging debates concerning topics and ideas central to AFSOC.

With the school's evolution and development of remote learning courses, Project 9 Studios saw an increase in the demand for instructional multimedia.

The studio adapted to the need and expanded its capabilities with the addition of new technology and tools. Supplementary cameras and microphones were used to capture and share inhouse lectures and panel discussions with the larger online community. New lights and studio tools were used to enhance production which resulted in more professional products for USAFSOS' growing collection of contemporary instructional videos.

Beyond the classroom, the USAFSOS Presents video series continues to flourish. ISD partnered with some of AFSOC's most experienced cadre to develop and produce stories from the field as well as generating critical conversations regarding important contemporary issues. The series consists of stories told by the leaders who lived them on the front-lines, important cultural stories shared to bridge knowledge gaps, and broadly focused table discussions paneled by a host of experts and educators engaged in a critical dialog. It is the aim of the ISD team to capture these unique and timely perspectives to populate a library accessible by both students and alumni to educate, inspire, and promote future USAFSOS connections after graduation.

Project 9: USAFSOS Presents

SOF Talks is a newly developed speakers program, created to offer a space for the SOF community to come together and share personal stories in an effort to educate, motivate, innovate, and inspire. Each SOF Talks event features two guest speakers, paired via a central theme. Recorded live from the Loftis Auditorium, USAFSOS, each speaker delivers to a real-time audience a major takeaway from a personal experience or event.


SOF 360 Podcast

Warfighting & Leadership Development

Department Chair



Mr. Jonathan Cary is the Warfighting & Leadership Development Department Chair. He is a retired USAF Lt Col with 20 years of service, spending most of that time in the Combat Search and Rescue community. He was a command pilot with over 2,000 hours in HH-60G and UH-1N helicopters. His combat experience includes multiple deployments to the Persian Gulf, the Balkans, and Afghanistan. While on active duty, he also had assignments as a Legislative Fellow in the United States Senate, a Plans Officer within Joint Staff J5, a Wing Executive Assistant, and as an Executive Assistant to a Joint Staff Flag Officer. He is a graduate of Purdue University with a B.A. in Criminology and a minor in history. He has an M.A. in Aerospace Science from Air University and is a graduate of The Joint and Combined Warfighting School at Joint Forces Staff College.

Warfighting & Leadership Development Department

The Warfighting & Leadership Development Department prepares Airmen to conduct and successfully accomplish worldwide special operations missions by educating them on direct and indirect approaches; exposing them to SOCOM's global SOF network, and highlighting AFSOC core mission areas with an eye towards AFSOC's Strategic Vision. The educational goal of the department is to ensure AFSOC personnel know how to use critical thinking, adaptability, and improvisation to achieve tactical, operational, and strategic objectives through unified effort.

In AY20, the Warfighting & Leadership Development Department conducted operational military education for AFSOC and other DoD personnel through a variety of formal courses, and mobile education events while revolutionizing course delivery through the creation of an online academic environment. The department focused its efforts on indoctrinating new AFSOC, enhancing SOF staff action and warfighting skills, developing mission commanders, and informing the next generation of AFSOC leaders. Further, it integrated themes of ethical behavior and value systems, deliberate force development, and joint planning methodologies into many of its courses. This ensured a focused investment in AFSOC human capital while simultaneously preparing Air Commandos for their role in Great Power Competition. Despite COVID19 mitigations and movement restrictions, the Department was able to support a limited amount of off-station education opportunities within the CONUS, PACOM, and EUCOM theaters. In 2020 the Department expanded its outreach and collaboration with JSOAC-E, Air University's LeMay Center, JSOU, and PACOM. Further, during the initial reaction to the pandemic, the Department quickly adapted several of its courses to online and remote learning formats. These actions prevented the shutdown of vital AFSOC education and training pipelines and reduced the health risks associated with indoctrinating high volumes of newly assigned AFSOC personnel. Remarkably, during this extremely difficult year, Department personnel also hosted command-wide outreach and educationally-infused events through various forums including USAFSOS Presents, SOF Talks, and Wicked Problems.

Dynamics of International Terrorism

The Dynamics of International Terrorism (DIT) course is designed for members of AFSOC and other elements of the Special Operations community as an indepth examination of the nature of terrorism and the means by which the United States, the DoD, and SOF can combat it. Attended widely by personnel from all Air Force major commands, other service branches, and many US Government agencies, DIT provides education on the organizations, motivations, and operational capabilities of international, domestic, and regional terrorist movements. The DIT curriculum is highlighted by personal accounts given by individuals





directly affected by terrorism. It also includes overviews of regional history and trends, discussions on how it is used by state actors in an era of global competition, an examination of the radicalization process, and reviews of institutional initiatives taken by key organizations (such as the FBI and INTERPOL). DIT revisits a continuing theme throughout the week, emphasizing specific instruction on protective measures that US government personnel and their families can employ to minimize the risks posed by terrorism. The traditional favorite part of the course is its live-fire Terrorist Capabilities Demonstration (TCD) using nonstandard firearms and high yield explosives, and a demonstration illustrating how a quadcopter can be used in a terrorist attack. In response to COVID19, the DIT cadre constructed a remote learning version of the course (to include the TCD) and used it to support the Combat Aviation Advisor and Non-Standard Aviation Pipelines during the initial stages of the pandemic response.

The cadre include a special agent in the Air Force Office of Special Investigations, an Air Force Intelligence Officer, an Explosive Ordnance Disposal technician, a Combat Arms instructor, and Mr. James Wilson, Range Safety Officer.

SOF Antiterrorism Level II

SOF Antiterrorism Level II is a USAF approved Antiterrorism Level II certification course compliant with requirements


contained in DoD Instruction O2000.16, Volume 1. While meeting the certification needs of antiterrorism officers (ATOs) from AFSOC, SOFAT2 attracts attendees from all other Air Force major commands, services, and several US Government agencies. Its robust, scenario-based curriculum is designed to prepare special operations forces conducting irregular warfare activities in uncertain and hostile contingency environments. SOFAT2 provides students with the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary to perform as a commander's terrorism subject matter expert and antiterrorism/mission assurance advisor. The course sequentially builds with realistic and contemporary injects, incremental risk analyses, hands-on technical demonstrations, and course-of-action development. It culminates in a capstone practicum requiring student teams to apply critical thinking and spontaneous problem solving while conducting a site survey for an IW deployment. The course director and primary instructor is a 3 time unit commander, former AFOSI special agent, and previous DIT



course director. Similar to DIT, SOFAT2 Cadre adapted the course presentation to fulfill Combat Aviation Advisor and Non-Standard Aviation Pipeline requirements during the early stages of pandemic response. Further, SOFAT2 faculty provided onsite education to special operations staff personnel supporting SOUTHCOM.

SOF Antiterrorism Level III

SOF Antiterrorism Level III launched in May 2017 to educate unit-level commanders on their responsibilities related



to antiterrorism. Constructed in accordance with requirements in DoD Instruction O2000.16 and designed for SOF officers, it supports the USAFSOS Squadron Leadership Course and Mission Commanders Course, but it can also be offered as a stand alone course upon request. With a very short duration, SOFAT3 has the flexibility to be integrated into headquarters all-calls, Wing staff meetings, MAJCOM commander orientation programs, etc. Any military officer, senior noncommissioned officer, or civilian with antiterrorism responsibilities would find this seminar-style overview of strategy, policy, and unit-level responsibilities to be vitally important in today's dynamic terrorism threat environment. Its director and primary instructor is a 3 time unit commander, former AFOSI special agent, and previous DIT course director.

Leadership Development Division


Flight Leadership Course



The AFSOC Commander-endorsed Flight Leadership Course (FLC) is a 5-day educational and mentorship-based course focused on paired officer and enlisted leadership teams. The course is one of the first opportunities for AFSOC to significantly invest in the education of its foundational leadership teams and works to implement many of the goals and lessons-learned from the USSOCOM Comprehensive Review, CSAF Action Orders, and AFSOC's 2020 Strategic Guidance. The course is comprised of three modular blocks of instruction. Each block of instruction focuses on a core competency of flight leadership. The first day discusses how to effectively lead yourself. It includes education and mentorship on concepts of the role of the flight leader,

unpacking value systems, emotional intelligence, and exploring the current ethical climate in the SOF community. The second day discusses how to effectively lead others. It includes instruction on principles of effective leadership and supervision, optimizing available resources, and a group leadership project. The third day discusses how to manage a flight. It addresses effective Air Force writing and communication, a panel-style Q&A with sitting Squadron Leadership Teams, and member resilience from an organizational standpoint. The fourth day is an informational day. It includes presentations from the Inspector General, Finance and Resource Management, and the unit's Judge Advocate General in order to familiarize students with these staff offices and learn how they can support their flight. The fifth day is an evaluation day. This day is designed for students to present their Flight Initial Action Plan, which is a working document to help guide them through the first year of their command. This provides flight leaders and soon-to-be flight leaders an opportunity to demonstrate critical thinking skills and an understanding of what they learned throughout the week. Despite COVID19 restrictions, FLC has conducted 100% face-to-face classes with additional health and safety measures in place to allow for in-person mentorbased education.

AFSOC Leadership Development



The AFSOC Leadership Development Course is a wing commander nominated course designed to prepare high performing O3s/O4s, MSgts, and GS12s/13s for future leadership roles. The course employs four general instructional formats to achieve this goal and interweaves in these components the themes of accountability, discipline, and competence. The first component dissects the strategic vision, guidance, and overarching AFSOC priorities through multiple senior leader mentorship sessions and guided discussions. It does this while emphasizing the role of SOF Airmen in leading current and future SOF formations and core mission areas. The second component explores various programmatic aspects of leading the AFSOC core mission areas, thereby providing students with a functional understanding of leveraging the resources available at their disposal. The third component is devoted to specialized topics that include readiness, resilience, Total Force Integration (TFI), force development and management, and critical thinking sessions. The final component incorporates guided panel discussions with

junior AFSOC Airmen, First Sergeants, and Chiefs.

Due to pandemic mitigations, the Leadership Development Course conducted a reduced number of iterations during AY20, but remained 100% face-to-face. Course Directors and USAFSOS Faculty are looking to increase offerings in 2021 to facilitate AFSOC's continued investment in human capital.



AFSOC Squadron Leadership

2020 challenged the consistent execution of the Squadron Leadership Course. Nevertheless, as movement restrictions eased, USAFSOS was able to hold two courses during the late summer months and within a compressed time period. With tremendous assistance from the 27th Special Operations Wing, one of these iterations was held at Cannon AFB, and marked the first execution of the course away from Hurlburt Field. COVID19 restrictions prevented many students and instructors from travelling, but innovate technologies like Blackboard Collaborate allowed USAFSOS to provide new and exciting ways to educate military command teams and spouse teams regardless of the physical location of the students or the instructors.

Warfighting Division Major Tyler Tracy, Division Chief Air Commando Indoctrination



Air Commando Indoctrination Remote Learning, is a remote learning course, which introduces the Air Commando culture and reviews historical events which led to the creation of US Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) and the Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC). Lessons explore the key concepts of special operations and irregular warfare as well as AFSOC mission areas, aircraft, and special tactics. It also incorporates Intercultural Competencies to help Airmen, quickly and accurately comprehend, then appropriately and effectively act, in culturally complex environments.

The remote learning format gives students the flexibility to accomplish most lessons at their own pace from a computer, tablet, or smart phone. The course has a live session in Blackboard Collaborate that features a SOF Senior Leader's perspective. This is an opportunity for AFSOC leadership to give their view on what it means to be an Air Commando. The live session also includes a lesson and guided class discussion on ethics

and professionalism.

This course targets newly-assigned personnel to Air Force Special Operations Command within the first 6 months of assignment or other personnel programmed for a position requiring knowledge of joint US special operations.

AFSOC Mission Command

AFSOC Mission Command is an operational military educational seminar designed to prepare prospective AFSOC mission commanders, Senior Enlisted Leaders (SEL), and other applicable DoD personnel for their duties and responsibilities in deployed environments. The course uses presentations, discussions, and personal interactions to educate future mission commanders and SELs on the internal and external processes of leading an AFSOC team, whether it is a unilateral offstation mission or a Joint Special Operations Air Component (JSOAC) mission. This course addresses the pre-deployment, deployment, and post-deployment challenges of standing up a bare base

operation or integrating into the infrastructure of an already established deployed location.

During AY20, USAFSOS used several ingenious methodologies to present SOFMC despite restrictions of movement brought about by COVID19. In addition to Face-to-Face offerings, off-station personnel participated in blended formats of the course via Video Teleconference (VTC) capabilities and on-location subject matter experts. The faculty's creative actions ensured AFSOC personnel had every opportunity to attend this valuable education.



SOF Air Command and Control



Special Operations Forces Air Command and Control (SOFAC2) exposes students to SOF doctrinal concepts and processes necessary to work and operate in various SOF command and control (C2) organizations. The course has two versions, SOFAC2 Remote Learning (SOFAC2-RL) and SOFAC2 Operations (SOFAC2-OPS). SOFAC2-RL is online, self-paced instruction designed to introduce students to SOF doctrinal concepts and processes which they must know to be effective and operate in a SOF C2 organization. SOFAC2-RL is a prerequisite for SOFAC2-OPS.

SOFAC2-OPS specific areas of instruction include command relationships, SOF air and ground components, Air Operations Center divisions and liaisons, ROE,

case studies, and SOF senior perspectives. Application of concepts and procedures will be reinforced by class exercises to ensure students understand the coordination between SOF ground forces, the Joint Air Operations Center (JAOC)/Special Operations Liaison Element (SOLE), and SOF's integration into the conventional theater C2 structure. The course is mandatory for Advanced Tactical Readiness (ATR) upgrade and prior to certain staff assignments, but also recommended for all other SOF operators, mission planners, and SOF support staff.

Warfighting and Leadership Courses in development during 2020

In addition to adapting existing courses following COVID19 restrictions of movement, the Warfighting and Leadership Department broke ground on two substantial courses aimed to deliberately invest and develop AFSOC's human capital within the continuum of leadership and warfighting.

L258, Staff Action Officer Course will focus on developing Air Commandos newly assigned to the MAJCOM staff. The course's aim is to provide nascent staff with the communication skills, strategic background, deliberate planning, and collaborative toolsets necessary for them to develop innovative, integrated, viable, and comprehensive solutions for the AFSOC Commander.

W222, Warfighting Fundamentals will be a comprehensive, in-depth experience aimed at developing Air Commandos for roles as airpower advocates in joint warfighting organizations. Education will focus on the various services' approach to warfighting, how the functional organizations contribute to warfighting, an introduction the joint warfighting functions, a practical experience in the joint planning process, and immersive in-class, and onlocation studies of historic battles. This will ensure AFSOC is ready to answer the nation's call in the current environment of Great Power Competition. Students will have a culminating exercise in which they practice the principles of joint warfare given a realistic problem set. At the end of the course students should have a solid understanding of how to design realistic and integrated airpower solutions which benefit the entirety of the joint force and positively contribute to the achievement of COCOM and national objectives.



Theater Engagement Department

Dr. Susan Alaniz is the Theater Engagement Department Chair. She is a retired USAF Lt Col with 20 years of active duty service and 11 years of service as a federal government civilian. She served as a master communications computer systems officer and a political/military strategist. Her assignments include mobile air control radar squadrons, the White House Communications Agency as an Overseas Presidential Communications Officer, and the HQ AFSOC A6 Communications and Information Directorate. Dr. Alaniz is currently serving as a supervisory political military program analyst. She is a graduate of the USAF Academy with a Bachelor of Science in Human Factors Engineering and a minor in French. She earned her Master of Public Administration degree from the University of Oklahoma. In addition, she earned her PhD in International Development from the University of Southern Mississippi. The focus area of her research is US Military Assistance and Recipient State Political Development.

The Theater Engagement Department prepares AFSOC Airmen to conduct Air Force special operations in the global context for Irregular Warfare (IW) and Great Power Competition (GPC). Students learn about the conflict environment and the competition continuum in each of the Geographic Combatant Commands (GCCs). Additionally, students learn about the Joint, Interagency, Intergovernment, and Multinational defense resources that are available for the specified missions in each of the GCCs. In recognition that US National Defense Strategy requires focus on strengthening allies and attracting new partners, students learn intercultural competence concepts and application skills relevant to the multinational, multicultural environments where partner states may have different cultural preferences from the typical American. To achieve US security goals, students learn about the US policy frameworks and funding authorities to conduct security cooperation. At the most advanced levels, USAFSOS students may be nominated by their commands to attend the Building Partner Aviation Capacity Seminar, the only US Government education and engagement seminar designed to build purposeful international aviation partnerships among national defense aviation decision makers and practitioners.

In AY20, the Theater Engagement Department conducted operational military education for AFSOC, other DoD, US interagency organizations, and 10 international military students from 8 AFRICOM partner states. The COVID19 pandemic crisis certainly had an impact on the delivery of education. Regular course iterations were cancelled beginning in April 2020, but innovation and creativity revolutionized opportunities for remote learning. With lighting speed, region and culture courses were transformed for delivery in less than 2 months to the selected remote learning technology. This new delivery methodology has made possible simultaneous instruction of students in multiple time zones.

Cultural Competence

Captain Melanie Engle, Division Chief

Intercultural Competence Basic Course (Oct 2019 - March 2020) and Air Commando Indoctrination Course Remote Learning as of April 2020

The Intercultural Competencies Basic Course is a one day course that provides attendees with introductory knowledge necessary for recognition of the influence of culture and cultural competence in military operations. Students learn about foundational concepts and principles as outlined in the Joint Concept on the Human Aspects of Military Operations published by the Joint Staff in 2016. Focus is placed on the AFSOC relevance of these concepts. In response to the COVID19 pandemic, in April 2020, this course transitioned from being a separate course to being merged with the newly created Air Commando Indoctrination Course (ACINDOC) for deliver via Remote Learning Technology. It also has opened possibilities for greater use of Air University ADLS tools to capitalize on other opportunities to deliver foundational concepts, enabling quicker focus on learning requirements unique to the Air Commando work environment.



Instructors of the Intercultural Competence Basic Course and ACINDOC culture learning objectives included Capt Ben Duffy, Capt Melanie Engle, Mr Mike Sneeder, Mr. Dan Courson, Mr. George Velez, Ms. Danica Domokos, and Ms. Naureen Butt. Ms. Danica Domokos was hired in August 2020 and now serves as the lead for Intercultural Competence Course development and delivery.

In AY 2020, the Intercultural Skills for Engagement course was delivered once in May 2020 in a virtual format in response to the global pandemic travel restrictions. However, recognizing the importance of face-to-face interaction to promote culture sensitivity, the course returned to a primarily in residence format in July 2020. AFSOC organizations with a mandatory attendance requirement for this course include Combat Aviation Advisors and the Non-Standard Aviation community. USAFSOS instructors in this course included Capt Melanie Engle, Capt Ben Duffy, Mr. Dan Courson, Mr. George Velez, Ms. Danica Domokos, Ms. Naureen Butt and Mr. Mike Sneeder.

Intercultural Skills for Engagement



The ENGAGE course is a 5-day in-residence course that builds general knowledge and skills to quickly and accurately comprehend, then appropriately and effectively act, in a culturally complex military mission environment to achieve the desired effect. Students learn about academic frameworks that help AFSOC members to recognize their own cultural preferences and to compare them with global variations. Specific focus is placed on identifying common tensions in intercultural communications and how those tensions are manifested in the continuum of conflict environment encountered by military members. Students learn communication and negotiation skills for mitigating the differences and also techniques for applying those skills in a variety of scenarios. Finally, this course teaches students how to conduct specific research into culture attributes of a given country or region.

Negotiations for AFSOC

The Negotiations for AFSOC course is designed to create negotiation skills required of AFSOC operators in culturally complex environments that are characterized by varying degrees of open or potential conflict. Focus is on the creation of frameworks for interaction that acknowledge the effects of stress due to physical and emotional factors. Students examine the military context in which negotiations must occur. To demonstrate learning of the concepts, students participate in multiple practical exercises in different scenarios. USAFSOS instructors in this course included Mr. Mike Grub and Dr. Dylan Dombret.

Theater Operations Major Nick Mazula, Division Chief

AFRICOM Theater

In AY20, the courseware for the AFRICOM Theater included two separate versions. The first is the 5-day legacy in-residence course. This course existed until March 2020. The intent of this course was to focus on US strategic interests in the AFRICOM AOR with emphasis placed on topics relevant to US Special Operations Force mission sets. Topics were addressed at unclassified and classified levels. The AFRICOM curriculum was designed to educate students on knowledge and comprehension level learning objectives to enable successful planning, operations, and deployment in the AOR. The course presented an array of USAFSOS faculty and guest SMEs to maximize student exposure to a range of military and civilian perspectives.



Starting in June 2020, the AFRICOM Theater Course was transformed for Remote Learning system methodology. Besides the adjustment in how students accessed the information, the course was presented in a 3-day format from June through November 2020. Since the transformation to remote learning, lesson materials are presented to students in both synchronous and asynchronous formats.

Currently, the AFRICOM course is a 4-day remote learning (online) course that focuses on the creation of regional and cultural understanding that will enable SOF personnel to operate effectively within the AFRICOM AOR. The course covers current political, military, social, and economic factors that influence operations in AFRICOM. With topics ranging from the strategic direction of the National Security Strategy to violent extremist organizations and development, the course aims to provide an overview of SOF operations throughout the continent with specific regard to the Horn of Africa, Northwest Africa, the Lake Chad Basin, the Sahel and the Maghreb regions. Course objectives also specifically include selected regional overviews and familiarization with the theater special operations command (TSOC), Combined Joint Task Force Horn of Africa (CJTFHOA) and conventional air forces (AFFOR) in the AOR.



CENTCOM Theater

The CENTCOM course provides a strategic overview of the CENTCOM AOR, focusing on history, geopolitics, operational culture and current operations. At the beginning of AY20, four in-residence courses and two mobile education events were held at Cannon AFB, NM; Hurlburt Field, FL; and MacDill AFB, FL. When the COVID19 pandemic forced in-person operations to shut down, the CENTCOM Theater course became the first theater course offered online by USAFSOS. Redesigning the in-residence CENTCOM theater course curriculum for the remote learning environment allowed students and instructors to continue education on CENTCOM issues from home for a safer learning experience. The course featured both resident USAFSOS instructors and guest instructors from academia and military career fields of higher learning, and various other government agencies. The course curriculum aligns with

current operational priorities as laid out by the 2018 National Defense Strategy, CENTCOM's Campaign Plan, and SOCCENT priorities, but each course iteration varies slightly to capture the ever-evolving nature of the CENTCOM environment.

EUCOM Theater

In AY20, the EUCOM course pivoted from inperson delivery to remote learning via Blackboard due to the COVID19 pandemic. This latest incarnation of the EUCOM course is an orientation course focusing on US National Interests and foundational information on the AOR (geography, history, demographics and root causes of conflicts) necessary for successful operations in theater. The EUCOM course constantly adapts to current events and changes in the strategic and operational environment as defined in the National Defense Strategy. EUCOM pulls from leading experts in the field, to include academia, the private sector, and government to provide the most up-to-date, relevant material to educate SOF personnel. The demand for EUCOM Theater education continues to increase due to increased tensions in Eastern Europe.



INDOPACOM Theater



The INDOPACOM course focuses on US strategic interests in Asia and the Pacific, providing AFSOC members with the historical, geographical, political, socio-economic, and cultural education needed to succeed in theater. Particular focus is given to AFSOC in-theater organizations. The course addresses security dynamics that influence SOF operations and affect our key partner nations in INDOPACOM, as well as INDOPACOM's Theater Campaign Plans. The course prioritizes education on current National Defense Strategy guidance, with specific material dedicated to the study of peer competition dynamics from China, North Korea and VEOs.

SOUTHCOM/NORTHCOM Theater

The SONOCOM Course is a Remote Learning course that orients US Forces to the USNORTHCOM and USSOUTHCOM AORs. This course focuses on the creation of regional and cultural understanding that will enable SOF personnel to operate more effectively within the NORTHCOM / SOUTHCOM AOR. This course deliberately aligns its topic selections with applicable AFSOC, Special Operations Command, North (SOCNORTH), Special Operations Command, South (SOCSOUTH) US Southern Command (USSOUTHCOM), US Northern Command (USNORTHCOM), US Special Operations Command (USSOCOM), and relevant Headquarters United



States Air Force (USAF) guidance, plans and operations in order to place tactical-level core SOF mission areas into operational and strategic contexts. The course features resident faculty, guest civilian and military subject matter experts, and covers current political, military, social, and economic factors that influence operations in USNORTHCOM / USSOUTHCOM.

Security Cooperation Major Mark Prusinowski, Division Chief

Combat Aviation Advising



The Combat Aviation Advising (CAA) course is specifically tailored for AFSOC's Combat Aviation Advisor (CAA) pipeline trainees as well as other SOF and USAF advisors by nomination. The CAA course educates future advisors on irregular warfare (IW) concepts in security force assistance (SFA), foreign internal defense (FID), and unconventional warfare (UW) operations. In addition, students get an overview of the major Security Cooperation and Assistance policies, legal restrictions, and key organizations that must be considered when planning security assistance programs. The course illustrates these concepts through vignettes and current operations lessons.

Experienced CAAs provide operators' perspectives and instruct trainees on challenges and solutions encountered in ongoing

advisory operations. A capstone exercise requires students to apply course concepts in a realworld scenario.

The CAA Phase 1 Mission Qualification Course requirements were redesigned to meet all training requirements that include Intro to Special Operations, Intro to Irregular Warfare, Intercultural Skills for Engagement, and the CAA

course. Dynamics of International Terrorism and Antiterrorism Level II follow CAA to complete remaining Phase 1 requirements. Upon completion of Phase 2, CAAs return to USAFSOS for Phase 3 to receive language, regional, and culture education for which they are selected. Furthermore, students may experience an immersion opportunity to employ their language skills in a country where they will likely deploy operationally in the future.

Building Partner Aviation Capacity Seminar



BPACS is designed to educate US SOF and partner nation aviation members on national security strategy formulation and execution. The seminar aims to expand purposely built networks with our allies and partners to optimize aviation interoperability, integration, and collaboration. Topics are selected to create a community of interest to promote greater understanding of the unique attributes of aviation capacities that contribute to effective internal and external national security goal achievement. The BPACS uses classroom discussions guided by US Department of Defense (DoD), other government agencies (OGA), university professors, and other experienced military and civilian practitioners, as well as practical exercises, country presentations and field studies/trips to achieve seminar education objectives. Topics are presented

in a seminar format to encourage collaborative learning. USAFSOS strives to make each seminar responsive to ongoing aviation security cooperation developments. The seminar format facilitates discussions on each PN's aviation structure similarities and differences supported by examples of aviation successes and failures.

In concert with the United States 2018 National Defense Strategy, the primary goal of the Building Partner Aviation Capacity Seminar (BPACS) is to strengthen allies and partners while attracting new partners through purposeful aviation partnership. National Security Aviation Topics and activities are selected to create opportunities that build mutual respect, facilitate regional consultative mechanisms, and deepen Special Operations Forces (SOF) aviation interoperability.

The BPACS schedule includes social and hospitality events during and after normal duty hours to encourage

rapport building and the creation of long-term relationships. BPACS participants are expected to participate in all social events to maximize partner building opportunities.

In AY20, one BPACS event was conducted for 26 US and international students. There were 10 international students representing 8 AFRICOM partner states. The pandemic precluded the conduct of additional BPACS iterations in this academic year. Plans had been made to conduct an inaugural EUCOM iteration of BPACS, but the pandemic required that the iteration be moved to AY21. The intent for out years is to conduct two Hurlburt iterations that are open to all GCCs, one in-theater EUCOM.



GUAGE CENTER





Language Training Detachment

The Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center's (DLIFLC) Language Training Detachment (LTD) continues to lead the way in world class foreign language education, designed specifically for AFSOC personnel. This talented and diverse team includes a Site Director, an Academic Specialist, 14 DLIFLC language professors, and one contract language professor.


The LTD works closely with all departments of the USAFSOS team to ensure synergy between language and culture education across the spectrum of USAFSOS educational programs. The languages offered by the LTD in 2020 included: Arabic (MSA, Egyptian, Iraqi, and Levantine), Dari, Farsi, French, Indonesian, Pashto, Polish, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, Tagalog, and Thai.

Language

Even after losing two months of non-IAT classes to the Pandemic during AY20, the LTD provided 31,334 student contact hours of language education to 275 students in 76 individual courses. In addition, the LTD administered tests to a total of 500 airmen who require a foreign language to accomplish the extremely important AFSOC missions. This critical testing included 360 Defense Language Proficiency Tests (DLPT) and 140 Oral Proficiency Interviews (OPI).

The 76 courses taught in AY20 included 48 Sustainment and Enhancement Training (SET) courses, designed to ensure AFSOC airmen are prepared for the mission; six Significant Language Training Events (SLTE), which are a minimum of 150 hours to enhance the language capabilities of more advanced speakers; nine Pre-Deployment Courses, provided immediately before deployments; and 13 Initial Acquisition Training (IAT) courses, which take AFSOC airmen from zero language capability to mission ready status in 16 – 29 weeks, depending on the language. The language professors tailor the educational programs to meet the operational requirements of each student who supports the AFSOC mission.

The IAT courses provide the foundation for language capability throughout AFSOC, with special emphasis on the Combat Aviation Advisors (CAA) of the 6th and 711th Special Operations Squadrons (SOS). During the year, the LTD conducted IAT courses in Arabic, French, Russian, Spanish, Tagalog, and Thai with phenomenal results. The LTD has had a 100% success rate for over 10 consecutive years; and this year, 100% of the IAT graduates exceeded the AFSOC standard.



The results this year were even more impressive than previous years as the global pandemic necessitated teaching virtually for over half of the year. The dedication of the LTD professors enabled the entire LTD to transition from the classroom to online learning in only two days without missing one hour of instruction. Even though everyone agrees that learning a foreign language is much more effective when done face-to-face, the outstanding work of the LTD professors enabled this year's students to achieve results almost identical to last year's students even though they were forced to learn online.

Most of the IAT students who graduated this year were


CAAs, both active duty and Air Force Reserve. Students also came to the LTD from the Language Enabled Airman Program (LEAP), US Army Civil Affairs, 7th Special Forces Group, the Air Force Office of Special Investigations (OSI), the 25th Intelligence Squadron, and medical personnel. A letter from the Director of AFOSI, praised the LTD's efforts in educating one of his field agents. The ability of this OSI agent to speak French was credited with saving multiple lives in a medical evacuation mission in West Africa.

Due to the global pandemic, in country immersions were very limited this year. The LTD team is always planning for the immersions that will best prepare students for their important missions after they become operational CAAs. For example, the cancelled immersions this year included Panama (Spanish), Latvia (Russian), Morocco (French), and Jordan (Arabic). Contacts made with allies in these countries will assist with successful immersions for students in the future.

In the dynamic world of AFSOC, the key to success is the ability to adapt to the changing missions around the world. The professors of the LTD are continuously looking for ways to enhance existing programs and develop new ones when necessary to support the foreign language proficiency requirements of current and future CAAs. The additional challenge of accomplishing these critical tasks online this year showcased the incredible talents and dedication to the mission of the Hurlburt Field LTD Team.




Mobile Education Events (MEEs) for AY20



The curriculum is an integration of Introduction to Special Operations and Intercultural Competencies. Combined, ACINDOC-RL satisfies all requirements for either course. This course is designed to educate and familiarize you with Air Force Special Operation Command (AFSOC), its mission, and its proud heritage beginning with the First Air Commando Group. It also focuses on the organizational components and missions of US Special Operations Command (USSOCOM), with origins dating back to WWII. Embedded within this historical context is the cultural competencies necessary in conducting Special Operations tasks for US National Defense Strategy objectives. This course provides building blocks to progress your foundational professional military knowledge while enhancing your credibility when working and interacting with joint SOF partners.

The course runs for 21 days and consists of four modules. Each module is designed to be completed sequentially, including the pre-test, self guided lessons, live Collaborate session lessons, and posttest with the end of course critique. You will find that the first nine days of the course offers flexibility to complete your lessons at a self-guided pace. There are roughly 18 hours allocated for independent learning, so plan your time wiselv.

Target Audience: This course is designed for newly assigned personnel (within 6 months of arrival) to AFSOC. It is also designed for other personnel in a position requiring knowledge of joint US Special Operations. The course is available to all others on a space available basis.



The Mission Command course is a professional military educational seminar designed to prepare prospective AFSOC mission commanders for their duties and responsibilities in a deployed environment. The course employs a variety of instructional methods to include presentations, discussions, and collaborative groups to educate mission commanders on the internal and external processes of leading an AFSOC element. This course is specially designed to address the infrastructure of an established, deployed location while examining pre-deployment, deployment, and post-deployment challenges. The course focuses on operational and support considerations for mission commanders including such topics as Air Force Special Operations doctrine, command and control relationships, rules of engagement, legal ramifications, risk management, safety, force protection, and senior enlisted perspectives. The course culminates with leadership perspectives from senior mentors who have served as deployed mission

commanders.

Target Audience: This course is designed for Air Force Special Operations Command personnel who have been selected or have the potential to serve as a mis-sion commander (MC) or Senior Enlisted Leader (SEL). This course primarily fo-cuses on preparing future operational MCs and SELs but is open to all others on a space available basis. SOF Antiterrorism Officer Level 2 course is a 5-day certification course for DoD Levels I and II Antiterrorism officers (ATO) (commissioned and non-commissioned). The course is designed to provide students with knowledge and appreciation of the organization, motivation, operational capabilities, and threat posed by terrorists on an international, national, and theater specific basis. It is geared towards individuals who have not received formal education and training regarding terrorism or antiterrorism. Strong emphasis is placed on force protection measures that potentially target AFSOC personnel and their families. Specific strategies are taught to minimize the threat index. Graduates of AT2 will be Level II certified and can perform the functions of ATOs IAW DoDI 2000.16, DoD Antiterrorism (AT) Standards.

Target Audience: Military officers (O-1 to O-4), enlisted (E-5 to E-8), US Government civilian employees designated by the commander to perform Antiterrorism (AT) duties and other individuals involved in or supporting AT/Force Protection (FP) programs. AT2 is a nominative course. Students are selected on an individual basis and notified of their selection by the course director. Selections are made approximately 4 weeks prior to the course start date. AFSOC and other SOF nominees are given priority, with other personnel accepted as space is available.

T200AFRICOM is a 5-day course that focuses on US strategic interests on the continent of Africa with emphasis placed upon items of greatest interest to US Special Operations Forces (SOF), in particular, to Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC) units that operate within the Africa Command (AFRICOM) Area of Responsibility. The course addresses the socio-economic, cultural, political, historical, and security dynamics that influence SOF operations in support of AFRICOM's Theater Campaign Plan. Due to its SOF focus, significant time is dedicated to operational perspective briefs presented by Special Operators who have deployed or conducted Joint Combined Exchange Training events throughout Africa. BPACS is designed to expose Partner Nation (PN) participants to the political, military, economic, social information, and infrastructure benefits of aviation resources in the development and defense of the Partner Nation. PN participants will learn specifically about US civilian-military relations, civilian-military aviation resource cooperation, and perspectives on civilian-military aviation operations. Students will gain knowledge about the benefits of a coordinated, comprehensive, and long-term Civilian-Military plan for the Partner Nation's aviation resource development.

Students will appreciate the role of aviation in extending the Partner Nation government's reach into "un-governed and under-governed spaces" – a US National Security Strategy goal. Furthermore, students will be educated on US Security Assistance prerequisites, programs, and processes to facilitate and ease Partner Nation-US Building Partner Aviation Capacity efforts. Various classroom exercises

and field trips that give Partner Nation and US personnel opportunities to learn about the Partner Nation's aviation capabilities and security challenges will facilitate this experience.

Target Audience: The BPACS goal is to bring Partner Nation military and civilian personnel together with US military and civilians to build trust and partnership as they work to build a shared, practical vision for the Partner Nation's aviation resource development. Participants that will be considered for nomination for seminar participation: Mid- to Senior-Level Partner Nation Personnel from E-IMET eligible countries, and US civilians and military (O-4 to O-6 / Civilian equivalent) with a present or future role in Partner Nation-US aviation contacts. Personnel should have a present or future role in aviation acquisition, training, operations, resource planning, or resource management.



The S200CAA course is a 15-day educational course that consists of four major sections of instruction: W100 Introduction to Special Ops; Introduction to Irregular Warfare Course; C200ENGAGE; and the S200CAA course as required by training requirements. The first portion of the course provides the foundation on the fundamentals of Air Commandos. The second portion provides students with rudimental concepts of irregular warfare (IW) and how IW relates to SOF missions. The third portion provides a solid foundation of cultural values and communications styles of specific countries and regions. The final portion of the course is devoted to specialized topics pertaining to Foreign Internal Defense (FID) doctrine, security cooperation activities, to include historical and current examples of CAA support in FID.

The Combat Aviation Advising Course begins with an examination of insurgency and instability to frame the operational environment in which Combat Aviation Advisors

(CAA) perform a FID mission. CAA gives students a greater understanding of strategic and operational drivers, as well as the necessity for comprehensive, realistic assessments when planning and conducting FID missions. CAA has an integrated practical exercise with a strategic/operational perspective. Throughout the exercise, and the course, students apply knowledge/understanding to analyze, design, and present a FID plan,that will assist a notional host nation, and its air forces, in their efforts to provide security and stability to the population.

Target Audience: S200CAA is the first phase of the Mission Qualification Course (MQC). This course is also for personnel who, through Air Advising (AA) engagements, conduct Foreign Internal Defense (FID) and/or Security Force Assistance (SFA) activities.





The USAF Chief of Staff's Culture, Region and Language Flight Plan defines cross cultural competence (3C) (a.k.a. Intercultural Competence) as "the ability to quickly and accurately comprehend, then appropriately and effectively act, in culturally complex environments, to achieve the desired effect." This course provides an introduction to 3C concepts for all AFSOF.

Target Audience: The Intercultural Competencies course enables Special Operations Forces (SOF) excellence in complex and ambiguous operational environments worldwide. The primary audience includes SOF personnel who engage in direct, face-

to-face interactions with foreign people as part of Irregular Warfare, Counterinsurgency, Counterterrorism, Foreign Internal Defense, Unconventional Warfare, medical operations, intelligence analysis, bilateral/multilateral exercise mission planning, Non-Standard Aviation, Civil Affairs, Military Information Support Operations, Humanitarian Assistance/Disaster Relief, Security Assistance and/or Foreign Military Sales. COMP is especially designed for SOF personnel anticipating a deployment outside CONUS. In addition, non-SOF government personnel who work or train with partner nations.



The Intercultural Skills for Engagement course seeks to provide attendees with general knowledge and skills to quickly and accurately comprehend, then appropriately and effectively act, in a culturally complex environment to achieve the desired effect without necessarily having prior exposure to a particular group, region, or its language. Students apply communication and negotiation skills in role-playing scenarios, and are exposed to a variety of interactive exercises that challenge their cultural norms. Additionally, the course addresses topics in comparative religions, military culture, food and health concerns in an intercultural setting, and culture shock. With an emphasis on SOF focus, the course will draw on former and current SOF personnel to discuss case studies and relevant concepts to enhance student learning. Ultimately, this course is designed as an introduction to provide a solid foundation for students to conduct further research into the cultural values and communications styles of specific

countries or regions.

Target Audience: Special Operations personnel who will be engaging in direct, face-to-face interactions with international personnel as part of their duties. This includes but is not limited to: Foreign Internal Defense, Irregular Warfare UTC medical personnel, bilateral/multilateral exercise mission planners, Non-Standard Aviation, Civil Affairs, Military Information Support Operations, and Foreign Military Sales. This course is especially constructed for personnel who anticipate going, but have not yet gone, on a deployment that requires this type of interaction. Other government personnel who anticipate working or training with international personnel will also benefit from this course.





MOIC prepares AFSOC and other selected SOF instructors to develop and teach curriculum. Students will develop skills by creating active learning environments focused on higher levels of learning by implementing various instructional methodologies. A brief overview of learning theory, the Instructional Systems Development process, and development of level-of-learning lesson plans is provided to allow immediate application of the instructional strategies that are discussed and practiced within the course. The course introduces learning evaluation and addresses basic principles in test item validity and construction. Students teach a variety of lessons using different instructional methodologies. The instructional methods taught in the course include lecture, guided discussion, case study, experiential learning, teaching interviews/panel discussions and demonstration performance. The course is delivered

Target Audience: AFSOC faculty members are the top priority and SOF personnel teaching in any service or joint education/training environment. MOIC is a SOF academic instructor course.


