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LOCATION

The United States Air Force Special Operations School (USAFSOS) is located at Hurlburt Field on northwest Florida's Gulf Coast, five miles west of Fort Walton Beach. It is collocated with the 492nd Special Operations Wing in The Alison Building (Bldg 90503, 357 Tully Street), one block east of the Hurlburt Field Lodging Office.



HERITAGE

USAFSOS is the product of a 50-year evolutionary process. In March 1961, President John F. Kennedy, responding to Chairman Nikita S. Khruschev's clarion call for "wars of national liberation," cited the need for countering "subversion and guerrilla warfare" that were the heart of Communist insurgency. As a result, the Air Force increased the emphasis given to special air warfare training. The United States Air Force Special Air Warfare School (USAFSAWS) was originally a Directorate of the 4410th Combat Crew Training Wing at Hurlburt Field. In 1968, the school was re-designated USAFSOS. In June 1987, USAFSOS, as an organizational element of the 23rd Air Force, was assigned to the US Special Operations Command (USSOCOM), headquartered at MacDill AFB, FL. In May 1990, the school became a direct reporting unit of the newly established Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC). In October 2008, with the stand-up of the Air Force Special Operations Training Center, USAFSOS was placed under that unit, which was later reorganized on 11 February 2013 and renamed the Air Force Special Operations Air Warfare Center. Most recently, USAFSOS aligned to the 492nd Special Operations Wing. During its formative years, the school's main thrust was the preparation of Air Force personnel for duty in Southeast Asia. Subsequently, USAFSOS has grown from teaching a single course the first year, to conducting 136 iterations of 21 unique formal courses and 55 customized, Mobile Education Events (MEEs) in AY19. USAFSOS currently provides SOFs indoctrination, as well as political, military, and cultural studies supporting SOF operations in the various combatant theaters. The school also provides language training, specialized instructions on irregular warfare principles, building partner nation aviation capacity, aviation foreign internal defense, dynamics of international terrorism, and command, control and integration of Air Force Special Operation Forces (AFSOF) assets and AFSOF leadership development.







DEPARTMENT





Support Department Chair



The Support Department is Chaired by Mr. Bob Love who provides direction for 11 civilians, 3 military members, and 3 contractors. The department is the backbone of the school touching all aspects of education and instruction. The department is responsible for the execution of administration, cyber operations, security, facility management, student and guest speaker support, resource management, audiovisual, graphics, video teleconferencing, and registrar functions.

The dedicated audiovisual specialists provide classified and non-classified multimedia and the associated software, hardware, and presentation systems for the schools auditoriums, classrooms, and conference rooms in order to carry out its mission.

Our classrooms feature fully upgraded digital systems, secure and non-secure video teleconference (VTC) systems, classroom recording and video editing to support course iterations. The audio-visual division is also capable of providing presentation systems from legacy to present-day technology. New in AY19 was the addition of two dedicated breakout rooms, specifically named Gnome Rooms 1 and 2, to honor the superior work of our AV team!

The always on-the-go cyber operations division team members not only provide day-to-day computer support for our faculty members and students alike. From desktop support, to remedying ticket resolution, to issuing properly configured student laptops,

to ensuring all DoD and subordinate cyber guidance is fully adhered to. USAFSOS would not function as smoothly as it does without their tireless dedication.

The student support division includes guest speaker support and is responsible for the support elements of all USAFSOS classes and Mobile Education Events. Student support performs registrar functions, which include loading/maintaining courses, loading/maintaining class iterations, quota allocation management, and maintaining student statuses in various personnel databases.


Guest speaker support provides travel itineraries for guest lecturers and manages honoraria payments to non-DoD speakers. Our registrar coordinates with 300 quota managers among USAF, sister services, and other DoD agencies to allocate seats in all classes assuring priority to AFSOC and other SOF personnel while also prioritizing other MAJCOM, sister services, and DoD agency training needs. The department provided various levels of support to over 5,100 students attending 22 unique courses in AY19.



STAFF & FACULTY

To accomplish its mission, USAFSOS employs a diverse workforce, all of whom are hired or assigned under a variety of staffing programs. The staff and faculty include active duty, active reserve, and temporary duty reserve military personnel, government civilians, civilian contractors, private consultants, and guest lecturers and speakers. In AY19, USAFSOS had 103 faculty and staff personnel assigned.

Active duty and reserve military personnel are typically assigned against specific educational support requirements, i.e., to act as Course Directors or Subject Matter Experts (SMEs), but some were assigned to mission support and unit administration positions. Government and non-government civilians also filled both education and support roles. Augmenting the school's resident instructor cadre, in AY19, were over 400 guest lecturers representing active and reservist military, retirees, former ambassadors, general officers, academics from various universities, and representatives from State Department, DoD, and other government agencies.



ADJUNCT INSTRUCTOR PROGRAM

USAFSOS has an active program to recruit Adjunct Instructors (Als) for enhancing content and bringing subject matter experts into the classroom. Active duty, Reserves, DOD Civilians, and contractors have all improved the operational military education curricula through sharing experiences and lessons learned. DEAN OF ACADEMICS





Office of the Dean of Academics



Mr. Michael Grub currently serves as the Dean for the US Air Force Special Operations School at Hurlburt Field, FL.

Prior to assuming the role of Dean, Mr. Grub served as the Warfighting & Leadership Department Chair, USAFSOS from 2016 to 2019. Mr. Grub's other major assignments during his 24-year Air Force career included: Air Force Special Operations Air Warfare Center Deputy Director for the Training/Education Directorate and Director of Irregular Warfare Plans, USAFSOS Vice Commandant, Deputy Commander of the 1st Special Operations Group, and HQ AFSOC Chief of Weapons and Tactics.

Mr. Grub led four deployments from 2008 to 2014 as a Combat Aviation Advisor (#449) Mi-17/Mi-171 Instructor Pilot to Yemen and Afghanistan where he developed partner nation counterterrorism vertical lift combat capability. As an MH-53J/M Pave Low evaluator pilot (#318) he joined AFSOC in 1998 and soon deployed to Operations ALLIED FORCE, SOUTHERN WATCH, ENDURING FREEDOM in 2001, and IRAQI FREEDOM, where he was part of TF Viking liberating northern Iraq during the first of his three Iraq tours.

Mr. Grub holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Military History and a Master of Arts degree in Military Arts & Science: Unconventional Warfare from American Military University. He is an academic award winner from the US Air Force Weapons School Class 02A (SOF Weapons Officer #14), and is published in the USAF Weapons Review magazine.

Institutional Effectiveness

During AY19, USAFSOS evaluated achievement of course goals and lesson objectives for each course conducted using professional observations. Using professional observations, verbal feedback, student reaction surveys, and measurements of learning (tests). Course directors also prepared end-of-course reports, which recapped and analyzed all aspects of course conduct. Additionally, Course After-Action Review Boards (CAARBs) were conducted for selected courses to discuss all these aspects, from student demographics to specific content and delivery, as well as any recommendations for course improvement.

USAFSOS conducted comprehensive Biennial Course Reviews (BCRs) for six USAFSOS courses with associated documentation, to include the syllabus, lesson objectives and evaluation instruments. Formal course reviews were conducted



for AFRICOM, CENTCOM, EUCOM, INDOPACOM, SOUTHCOM/NORTHCOM and BPACS. Course stakeholders participated in the reviews, which also included USAFSOS leadership, subject matter experts, curriculum developers, and course directors. The reviews validated much of the existing content while making recommendations for updates to maintain the highest levels of currency and relevancy for target audiences. USAFSOS will continue to conduct formal reviews for all its courses at least biennially and complete required updates to course syllabi and associated lesson plans.

Blackboard Learning Management System



Continual optimization and use of the Blackboard® Learning Management System (LMS) and integrated Genius Student Information System (SIS) software are the key enablers of USAFSOS global classrooms. Our 100% use policy offers a student experience, with full spectrum support from first enrollment into the classroom, through graduation, and delivering transcripts. All USAFSOS courses are facilitated through the SIS with 24/7 access to formal course iterations offering unprecedented student reach back for six months after graduation. The SIS further assists instructors and registrar personnel with automated student reminders, template e-mails, integrated reporting service subscriptions, and much more. As web-based platforms, the LMS and SIS work seamlessly together to provide optimum system availability for students and staff regardless of location or device.

Instructional Design (ID) Team



The Instructional Design (ID) team supports the analysis, design, development, implementation, and evaluation of the USAFSOS curricula for blended and in-residence courses. Through collaboration with subject matter experts and stakeholders, the team ensures the syllabi reflect relevant behaviors and learning competencies, and builds designs that course activities are both engaging and effective.

During AY19, the ID team facilitated the design, development, and formative evaluation of several new courses including the Squadron Leadership Course (L400SLC), which is a component of the four-tier series, focused on deliberate development of AFSOC leadership teams. The ID team also supported the redesign of the Introduction to Special Operations (W100ISO) course with an emphasis on the collaborative learning environment. Innovative technology introduced to the W100ISO classroom collected performance data, providing immediate feedback to students and enabling substantive course revisions between iterations.

The ID team's fresh approach to infusing multimedia into curriculum has led to a series of contemporary instructional videos designed, storyboarded, and published in-house, used to illustrate connections between concepts and real-world examples.

Rich multimedia is proving to encourage critical thinking and serve as a catalyst for discussion in and out of the classroom. The effective use of educational technology is a force multiplier, and the ID team exists to clarify and strengthen student learning outcomes, support academic departments and course directors in the creation and refinement of instructional strategies and materials, and improve the efficiency and cost-effectiveness of USAFSOS's educational support to AFSOC.





With the exciting launch of the new Project 9 Studios, the ID team is currently developing a host of audio and visual components in continued support of the USAFSOS mission of student learning at the highest levels. The studio space is outfitted with technologies to support instructional lecture recording and live-streaming capabilities, providing real-time instructor demonstrations for a more dynamic student experience. State-of-the-art video production results in captivating graphics and professional products, centrally branded and exclusive to the school. The studio's contemporary podcasting arrangement permits the scripting, producing, recording, and editing a host of informational, engaging debates concerning topics and ideas central to AFSOC.

The functional studio space directly serves the ID team's fresh approach to infusing multimedia into the curriculum in a myriad of ways. A growing collection of contemporary instructional videos, designed and published in-house, are used in various courses to reinforce connections between concepts and real-world applications. For example, a series of videos highlighting weapons capabilities was produced and integrated into the classroom to replace static material and to support mobile education events.




Beyond the classroom, the team is hard at work on the new USAFSOS Presents video series, dedicated to recording both one-of-a-kind stories from the field as well as generating critical conversations regarding important contemporary issues.

The wide-ranging series already includes conversational interviews and reports from some of our most experienced cadre. Stories told by the leaders who lived them on the frontlines, important cultural stories shared to bridge knowledge gaps, and broadly focused table discussions paneled by a host of experts and educators engaged in a critical dialog bring the conversation to a wider military audience.

It is the ultimate aim of the ID team to capture these unique and timely perspectives to populate a one-of-a-kind library accessible by both students and alumni to educate, inspire, and promote future USAFSOS connections after graduation.

"Wicked Problems" is a two-part event where an initial presentation, screening, or lecture is followed by a full auditorium discussion, as well as employment of instructional technology and live streaming for widest participation and collaboration.

The Dean's Speakers Series for this year includes a conversation with SMSgt Jason Herriges on facing the devastation at Tyndall AFB after Hurricane Michael and an engaging conversation with Msgt (Ret) Bart Decker, an original AFSOC Horseman.

SOF Talks







Warfighting & Leadership Development Department Chair



Mr. Jonathan Cary is the Warfighting & Leadership Development Department Chair. He is a retired USAF Lt Col with 20 years of service, spending most of that time in the Combat Search and Rescue community. He was a command pilot with over 2,000 hours in the HH-60G and UH-1N helicopters. His combat experience includes Operations SOUTHERN WATCH, ALLIED FORCE, ENDURING FREEDOM, and IRAQI FREEDOM. While on active duty, he also had assignments as a Legislative Fellow in the United States Senate, a Plans Officer within the Joint Staff J5, Strategy and Plans Directorate, and within the helicopter flight test community. He is a 1996 graduate of Purdue University with a B.A. in Criminology and a minor in history. He has an M.A. in Aerospace Science from Air University and is a graduate of The Joint and Combined Warfighting School at Joint Forces Staff College.

Warfighting & Leadership Development Department

The Warfighting & Leadership Development Department conducted operational military education for AFSOF and other DOD personnel through a variety of formal courses and mobile education events during AY19. This department focused its efforts on indoctrinating new AFSOF, enhancing SOF force protection skills, developing mission commanders, informing the next generation of AFSOC leaders, and exposing deploying personnel to the intricacies of SOF command and control, and USSOCOM strategic responsibilities.

The department prepares Airmen to conduct and successfully accomplish special operations worldwide missions by educating them on direct and indirect approaches; exposing them to SOCOM's global SOF network and highlighting AFSOC core mission areas. The educational goal of the department is to ensure AFSOC personnel know how to use critical thinking, adaptability, and improvisation to successfully conduct special operations to achieve tactical, operational, and strategic objectives through unified effort.

Force Protection Division Mr. Richard M. Reddecliff, Division Chief





The Dynamics of International Terrorism (DIT) course is designed for members of AFSOC and other elements of the Special Operations community as an in-depth examination of the nature of terrorism and the means by which the United States, the DoD, and SOF can combat it. Attended widely by personnel from all Air Force major commands, other service branches, and many US Government agencies, DIT provides education on the organizations, motivations, and operational capabilities of international, domestic, and regional terrorist movements. The DIT curriculum is highlighted by personal accounts given by individuals directly affected by terrorism. It also includes overviews of regional history and trends; an examination of the radicalization process; and institutional initiatives taken by key organizations (such as the FBI and INTERPOL). DIT revisits a continuing theme throughout the week, emphasizing specific instruction on protective measures that US government personnel

and their families can employ to minimize the risks posed by terrorism. The traditional favorite part of the course is its live-fire Terrorist Capabilities Demonstration (TCD) using non-standard firearms and high yield explosives. New to the General



Dozier Range, the TCD in AY19 was a demonstration illustrating how a quadcopter can be used in a terrorist attack.

In AY19, USAFSOS delivered six resident DIT courses and educated 393 DIT students. Cadre include a special agent in the Air Force Office of Special Investigations, an Explosive Ordnance Disposal technician, a Combat Arms instructor, and Mr. James Wilson, Range Safety Officer; the AY19 winner of the AFSOC Weapons Safety Professional of the Year award.


SOF Anti-Terrorism Level 2

SOF Antiterrorism Level 2 is a USAF-approved Antiterrorism Level II certification course compliant with requirements contained in DoD Instruction O-2000.16, Volume 1. While meeting the certification needs of antiterrorism officers (ATOs) from AFSOC, SOF-AT2 attracts attendees from all other Air Force major commands, services, and several US Government agencies. Its robust, scenario-based curriculum is designed to prepare special operations forces conducting irregular warfare activities in uncertain and hostile contingency environments. SOF-AT2 provides students with the knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary to perform as a commander's terrorism subject matter expert and antiterrorism/mission assurance advisor. The course sequentially builds with realistic and contemporary injects, incremental risk analyses, hands-on technical demonstrations, and course-of-action development. It culminates in a capstone practicum requiring student teams



to apply critical thinking and spontaneous problem solving while assigned to conduct a site survey for an IW deployment. SOF-AT2 certified 317 graduates as DoD ATOs in AY19. Its course director is an active duty Air Force technical sergeant with multiple deployments as a member of Security Forces, plus experience as the current ATO for the 492d Special Operations Wing.

SOF Anti-Terrorism Level 3



SOF Antiterrorism Level 3 launched in May 2017 to educate unit-level commanders on their responsibilities related to antiterrorism. Constructed in accordance with requirements in DoD Instruction O-2000.16 and designed for SOF officers, it supports the USAFSOS Squadron Leadership Course and Mission Commanders Course, but it can also be offered as a standalone course upon request. With a very short duration (1-2 hours), SOF-AT3 has the flexibility to be integrated into headquarters all-calls, Wing staff meetings, MAJCOM commander orientation programs, etc. Any military officer, senior non-commissioned officer, or civilian with antiterrorism responsibilities would find this seminar-style overview of strategy, policy, and unit-level responsibilities to be vitally important in today's dynamic terrorism threat environment. In AY19, USAFSOS certified 199 students with the one-time requirement for AT Level III training. Its director and primary instructor is a 3-time unit commander, former AFOSI special agent, and previous DIT course director.

Leadership Development Division

Flight Leadership

The AFSOC Commander endorsed Flight Leadership Course is a 5-day educational and mentorshipbased course focused on paired officer and enlisted leadership teams that is comprised of three modular blocks of instruction. Each block of instruction focuses on a core competency of flight leadership. The first day discusses how to effectively lead yourself. It includes education and mentorship on concepts of the role of the flight leader, unpacking our value systems, and exploring the current ethical climate in the SOF community. The second day discusses how to effectively lead others. It includes instruction on principles of effective leadership and supervision, optimizing available resources, and a group leadership project. The third day discusses how to manage a flight. It addresses effective Air Force writing and communication, a panel-style Q&A with sitting Squadron Leadership Teams, and ensuring



member resilience from an organizational standpoint. Day 4 is an informational day. It includes presentations from the Inspector General, Financial and Resource Management, and the unit's Judge Advocate General in order to familiarize students with these staff offices and learn how they can support their flight. The 5th day is an evaluation day. This day is designed for students to present their Flight Initial Action Plan, which is a working document to help guide them through the first year of their command. This provides flight leaders and soon-to-be flight leaders an opportunity to demonstrate critical thinking skills and an understanding of what they learned throughout the week.

AFSOC Leadership Development



The AFSOC Leadership Development Course is a wing commander-nominated course designed to prepare highperforming O-3s/O-4s, MSgts, and GS-12s/13s for future leadership roles. The course employs four general instructional formats to achieve this goal. The first component dissects the strategic vision, guidance, and overarching AFSOC priorities through multiple senior leader mentorship sessions and guided discussions. It does this while emphasizing the role of SOF airmen in leading current and future SOF formations and core The second component explores various mission areas. programmatic aspects of leading the AFSOC core mission areas, thereby providing students with a functional understanding of leveraging the resources available at their disposal. The third component is devoted to specialized topics that include readiness, resilience, Total Force Association (TFA), force development and management, and critical thinking sessions. The final component incorporates guided panel discussions with junior AFSOC Airmen, First Sergeants, Chiefs, industry leaders, and current AFSOC Squadron Commanders.

AFSOC Squadron Leadership

Newly appointed AFSOC leadership teams attend the AFSOC Squadron Leadership Course. This is a 5-day experience that discusses AFSOC culture, executing the mission, leading people, managing resources, and improving the unit. Future Squadron Commanders, Senior Enlisted Leaders, and their spouses are provided a broad array of leadership perspectives and orientation to organizations that will provide assistance during the command tour. Each pair-leadership team is presented a "commander's toolkit" from the AFSOC perspective.

Participants will have many interactions with AFSOC senior leaders. The overall goal is to provide first-hand knowledge on the various complex issues a squadron leadership team may face. Through sharing evaluated experiences, leadership teams will be in the best position possible to begin time in command.

Introduction to Special Operations

Introduction to Special Operations is a three-day, team-based, in-residence course, which introduces the Air Commando culture and reviews historical events which led to the creation of US Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) and the Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC). Lessons explore the key concepts of special operations and irregular warfare as well as AFSOC mission areas, aircraft, and special tactics.

SOF Senior Leader's perspective is an opportunity for AFSOC leadership to give their view on what it means to be an Air Commando, share personal experiences, mold an ethical mindset for new Air Commandos, and answer questions about Special Operations. Finally, students participate in a capstone exercise within their teams, applying new knowledge to a Special Operations scenario.

This course targets newly assigned personnel to Air Force Special Operations Command within the first 6 months of assignment or other personnel programmed for a position requiring knowledge of

AFSOC Mission Command



AFSOC Mission Command is an operational military educational seminar designed to prepare prospective AFSOC mission commanders, Senior Enlisted Leaders (SEL), and other applicable DoD personnel for their duties and responsibilities in deployed environments. The course uses presentations, discussions, and personal interactions to educate future mission commanders and SELs on the internal and external processes of leading an AFSOC team, whether it is a unilateral off-station mission or a Joint Special Operations Air Component (JSOAC) mission. This course addresses the pre-deployment, deployment, and post-deployment challenges of standing up a bare base operation or integrating into the infrastructure of an already established deployed location.

SOF Air Command and Control

SOFAC2C exposes students to SOF doctrinal concepts and processes necessary to work and operate in various SOF command and control (C2) organizations. Specific areas of instruction include command relationships, SOF C2 nodes, air operations center functionality, CAF integration, and SOF senior perspectives. This course covers operational level SOF C2 concepts. It is designed for AFSOF personnel who could be tasked to work on a JSOAC or Special Operations Liaison Element (SOLE) staff, or as a liaison in an embassy, Special Operations Joint Task Force, or other agency. The course is mandatory for Advanced Tactical Readiness (ATR) upgrade and prior to certain staff assignments, but also recommended for all other SOF operators, mission planners, and SOF support staff members. AY19 found SOFAC2C go from a five day in-residence course to a phased, blended learning approach that combines online study with two days of classroom instruction.



Ms. Susan Alaniz is the Chairperson for the USAFSOS Theater Engagement Department. Ms. Alaniz is a retired Air Force Lt Col who served as a communications officer and political/military strategist. Her previous assignments included mobile air control radar squadrons, the White House Communications Agency as an Overseas Presidential Communications Officer, and the HQ AFSOC A6 Communications and Information Directorate. She is a graduate of the USAF Academy and the University of Oklahoma. In addition, she is a current PhD Candidate, in International Development at the University of Southern Mississippi. Her focus area of study is US Military Assistance and Recipient State Political Development.

Theater Engagement Department

AY19 continued the long-standing record of excellence by the Theater Engagement Department for providing political, cultural, and security education for AFSOF in each COCOM. Theater Engagement courses educated students on the concepts and skills necessary for successful international SOF engagement in tandem with the other departments at USAFSOS. Formal courses ranged from one-day to two weeks in length and covered topics spanning engagement with partner-nation militaries and civilian defense leaders to tactical operations in ongoing insurgency zones. Department course directors also executed the vast majority of mobile education events for the entire school, illustrating the persistent mission need for updated theater engagement education.

Culture and Language Division

Capt Melanie A. Engle, Division Chief

Intercultural Competencies



The Intercultural Competencies Course is an 8-hour course that provides attendees with basic knowledge and skills to quickly and accurately comprehend, then appropriately and effectively act, in a culturally complex environment to achieve the desired effect without necessarily having prior exposure to a particular group, region, or its language. This course is designed as an introduction to culture and intercultural communication that provides a basic foundation for SOF students to conduct further research into the cultural values, beliefs, behaviors, and norms of people in other countries or regions. C100COMP acts as an enabler to SOF excellence in complex and ambiguous operational environments worldwide. It endeavors to impart the most basic concepts of intercultural competence.

Intercultural Skills for Engagement



The Intercultural Skills for Engagement course is a 5-day course that provides attendees with general knowledge and skills to quickly and accurately comprehend, then appropriately and effectively act, in a culturally complex environment to achieve the desired effect without necessarily having prior exposure to a particular group, region or its language. Students will apply communication and negotiation skills in role-playing scenarios, and are exposed to a variety of hands-on exercises that challenge their own cultural norms. Moreover, the course addresses topics in comparative religions, corruption, cultural geography, gender dynamics, working with the media, working with interpreters, food, and culture shock. Due to its SOF focus, the course draws on former and current SOF personnel to discuss case studies and lessons learned with the students. Ultimately, this course provides a solid foundation for students to conduct further research, as their mission and individual interests dictate, into the cultural values and

communications styles of specific countries or regions.

Two additional courses are currently being created within the Culture and Language Division with the goal of becoming available for AFSOC in late AY20.

Intercultural Competence Skills for Analysis: This course is being designed to meet the learning needs of AFSOC personnel with a responsibility to plan for AFSOC global missions or to analyze data that will inform global operations. This course will provide attendees with general knowledge and skills to quickly and accurately comprehend articles, videos, and planning strategies presented in or about culturally diverse environments. Topics addressed include global intercultural trait analysis, comparative religion, comparative conflict management, and guidance on recognizing one's own cultural biases.

Advanced Negotiation: This course is being designed to meet the advanced negotiation skills required of AFSOC operators in culturally complex environments that are characterized by varying degrees of open or potential conflict. Focus is on the creation of application level skills that students can use to advance their unit's deployed mission effectiveness.

Security Cooperation Division Major Mark A. Prusinowski, Division Chief

Combat Aviation Advising



The Combat Aviation Advising (CAA) course is specifically tailored for AFSOC's Combat Aviation Advisor (CAA) pipeline trainees as well as other SOF and USAF advisors by nomination. The CAA course educates future advisors on irregular warfare (IW) concepts in security force assistance (SFA), foreign internal defense (FID), and unconventional warfare (UW) operations. In addition, students get an overview of the major Security Cooperation and Assistance policies, legal restrictions, and key organizations that must be considered when planning security assistance programs. The course illustrates these concepts through vignettes and current operations lessons.

Experienced CAAs provide operators' perspectives and instruct trainees on challenges and solutions encountered in ongoing advisory operations. A capstone exercise requires students to apply course concepts in a real-world scenario.

The CAA Phase 1 Mission Qualification Course requirements were redesigned to meet all training requirements that include Intro to Special Operations, Intro to Irregular Warfare, Intercultural Skills for Engagement, and the CAA course. Dynamics of International Terrorism and Antiterrorism Level II follow S200CAA to complete remaining Phase 1 requirements. Upon completion of Phase 2, CAAs return to USAFSOS for Phase 3 to receive language, regional, and culture education for which they are selected. Furthermore, students may experience an immersion opportunity to employ their language skills in a country where they will likely deploy operationally in the future.

Building Partner Aviation Capacity Seminar

AFSOC's Building Partner Aviation Capacity Seminar (BPACS) continues to be recognized as a leader in the US Government for integrating aviation enterprise learning objectives for national security with relevant and cutting edge presentations in a joint, interagency and multilateral collaborative seminar.

BPACS, since its inception, has emphasized seminarstyle participation by all attendees, guest speakers, and USAFSOS staff. US students can expect to learn as much from their international student counterparts as from the formal presentations and field tours. Engagement opportunities have expanded to events outside the classroom through continuous social activities, site visits, and partner-nation presentations as part of the robust two-week seminar schedule.

The BPACS was conducted three times in FY19. Two were conducted at Hurlburt Field, and for the first time, an iteration was conducted off station at Kadena Air Base in Japan. Between international and US attendees, FY19 BPACS iterations hosted participants



from each COCOM, the Joint DoD community, and three interagency organizations. The seminar's guest speakers were recruited from across the US national aviation enterprise to include Department of Defense, Department of Homeland Security, Federal Aviation Administration, Department of State, US Agency for International Development, and many others. To ensure expert and full-range coverage of the aviation enterprise as it pertains to national security objectives, inclusion of state and civil authorities is critical. To close out the year, USAFSOS executed the 35th iteration of BPACS in September at Kadena Air Base with a specific focus on the INDOPACOM Geographic Combatant Command. The seminar was hosted by the 353rd Special Operations Group. This seminar added many firsts to the BPACS repertoire. Besides being the first off Hurlburt iteration, full funding was provided by the USINDOPACOM authorization for the Asia Pacific Reassurance Initiative.



SOCPAC served as advocate for the funding and liaison to the embassies of 22 attendees from 10 priority states. In addition, this BPACS was the largest of any iteration yet, with 56 total attendees, 26 international and 34 US. We were honored to

host the SOCPAC/CV, COL Sean Berg as he served as distinguished guest speaker at the graduation luncheon. We are excited about the energy being generated in the US Government Security Cooperation community towards the BPACS as an engagement tool for military cooperation. We are currently planning to execute our first EUCOM focused seminar in FY20.

International Military Student Officer



USAFSOS hosts international visitors as part of Security Assistance Training and Building Partnership Capacity programs. The International Military Student Officer (IMSO) is the point of contact for Security Assistance Training Program (SATP) providing daily oversight and management for all international military student operations. Due to the workload, USAFSOS has two fully certified personnel who are qualified to provide IMSO services.

During this academic year, the IMSO coordinated 42 international visitor events hosting personnel from 33 different countries who participated in BPACS. Duties included establishing contact with Air Force Security Assistance and Training (AFSAT) country managers, Embassy Security Cooperation Officers and Foreign National Staff for student information, Invitational Travel Orders, funding, and travel arrivals and departures. The IMSO also coordinated with AFSOC and Eglin Foreign Disclosure Offices, and the 1 SOW Director of Staff for other international guest visit approvals, base access, and unescorted access as necessary.

IMSOs were responsible for ensuring billeting and transportation arrangements, ensured

students were provided pay advances, and that travel vouchers are completed, as necessary. IMSOs also maintained contact with home countries through arrival and departure reports on all students.



Theater Operations Division Major Johnny C. Smith, Division Chief

AFRICOM Theater



The AFRICOM course synthesizes a wide range of knowledge, research and experience to offer students consolidated education in preparation for a variety of deployment and staff taskings. With topics ranging from the strategic direction of the 2018 National Security Strategy to the impact of environmental challenges on fueling violent extremist organizations, the course aims to provide a strategy-to-task review of SOF operations throughout the continent with specific regard to the Horn of Africa, NW Africa, Lake Chad Basin, and the Mahgreb/Sahel regions. Course objectives also specifically include interoperability with USG entities such as USAID and the Department of State, friendly international organizations to include the UN and World Bank, regional international bodies such as AMISOM and ECOWAS, as well as challenges posed by great power competitor states such as Russia and China in the region. These multi-faceted challenges to mission accomplishment are portrayed atop a backdrop of cultural and religious familiarization geared towards enhancing our SOF warfighters' ability to navigate this challenging landscape and ensure mission success.

CENTCOM Theater

The CENTCOM course provides a strategic overview of the CENTCOM AOR, focusing on history, geopolitics, operational culture and current operations. The course features both resident USAFSOS instructors and guest instructors from academia, military institutions of higher learning, and various other government agencies and positions. In AY19, a total of

148 students attended five total in-residence course iterations and one three-day Mobile Education Event tailored to the specific unit's mission in AY19. Courses were held at AFSOC's primary bases, Hurlburt Field, FL and Cannon AFB, NM. The CENTCOM Course was also held at the Joint Special Operations University on MacDill AFB in order to provide easier course opportunities for Special Operations Command-Central (SOCCENT) personnel. The course curriculum aligns with current operational priorities as laid out by the 2018 National Defense Strategy, CENTCOM's Campaign Plan, and SOCCENT priorities, but each course iteration varies slightly to address the evolving nature of the CENTCOM environment.



EUCOM Theater

The EUCOM course increased both on and off-site full-course iterations and MEEs. The demand for EUCOM Theater education continues to increase due to increased tensions in Eastern Europe. These tensions stem from revisionist intentions by Russia, as well as threats from violent extremists organizations and returning foreign fighters from hostilities in MENA. In order to meet this demand, EUCOM full-course iterations and MEEs were conducted to educate SOF personnel at RAF Mildenhall, Fort Bragg, and Will Rogers Air National Guard Base in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The EUCOM course constantly adapts to current events and changes in the strategic and operational environment as defined in the National Defense Strategy. Furthermore, the course is tailorable to meet the needs of specific SOF units. EUCOM pulls from leading experts in the field, to include academia, the private sector, and government to provide the most up-to-date, relevant material to educate SOF personnel.



INDOPACOM Theater



The INDOPACOM course focuses on US strategic interests in Asia and the Pacific, providing AFSOC members with the historical, geographical, political, socioeconomic, and cultural education needed to succeed in theater. Particular focus is on the needs of AFSOC in-theater organizations. The course addresses security dynamics that influence SOF operations and affect our key partner nations in INDOPACOM, as well as INDOPACOM's Theater Campaign Plans. The course prioritizes education on current National Defense Strategy guidance, with specific material dedicated to the study of peer competition dynamics from China and the instability from nuclear equipped North Korea. Due to its SOF focus, significant time is dedicated to operational perspective lessons presented by special operators who have deployed, conducted joint training with, or participated in exercises with partner nation forces throughout Asia. These lessons provide valuable insights on maximizing cultural

competency in security cooperation with INDOPACOM partners. Students will also learn more about the most relevant terrorist and insurgent groups, transnational crime, and regional organizations.

SOUTHCOM/NORTHCOM Theater

The SOUTHCOM/NORTHCOM Theater course addresses US strategic interests in the US SOUTHCOM and US NORTHCOM AOR, with an emphasis on topics of greatest interest to US SOF. This course focuses on the creation of regional expertise and cultural understanding to enable SOF personnel, particularly those from AFSOC, to operate more effectively within the USSOUTHCOM/USNORTHCOM AOR. Course material covers relevant policies, directives, rules of engagement, risk management procedures, force protection, and associated funding authorities for the USSOUTHCOM/USNORTHCOM AOR.

This course deliberately seeks to align its topic selections with the applicable AFSOC, USSOCOM, SOCSOUTH, USSOUTHCOM, SOCNORTH, USNORTHCOM and relevant Headquarters USAF



guidance, plans and operations. The course covers current political, military, social, and economic factors that influence or are affected by SOF operations. The aim of the course is to provide tactical level knowledge with particular emphasis given to extra-hemispherical actors and their influence in the SOUTHCOM/NORTHCOM regions. In recognition of the changing nature of international conflict, emphasis is placed on the role of US and international interagency structures in the accomplishment of Department of Defense (DoD) mission objectives.

Language Training Detachment

The Defense Language Institute Foreign Language Center's (DLIFLC) Language Training Detachment (LTD) is an integral part of the Language and Culture Center (LCC). This talented and diverse team includes a Site Director, an Academic Specialist, 14 DLIFLC language professors, and two contract language professors.

The LTD works closely with the Theater Engagement Department to provide synergy to both the Theater Engagement programs and the foreign language education programs. The languages offered by the LTD in AY19 included: Arabic (MSA, Iraqi, and Levantine), Dari, Farsi, French, Indonesian, Polish, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, Tagalog, Thai, and Urdu. During AY19, the LTC provided 25,101 student contact hours of language education to 248 students in 13 different languages. In addition, the LTD administered 12 Defense Language Aptitude Batteries (DLAB), 160 Oral Proficiency Interviews (OPI), and 551 Defense Language Proficiency Tests (DLPT).


Language

In addition to Initial Acquisition Training (IAT), the LTD offered multiple versions of Sustainment and Enhancement Training (SET), Significant Language Training Events (SLTE), Familiarization Training, and Pre-Deployment Training. The language professors tailor the education to meet the operational requirements of the USAF Special Operations Command (AFSOC).

The IAT courses provide the foundation for language capability throughout AFSOC, with special emphasis on the Combat Aviation Advisors (CAA) of the 6th and 711th Special Operations Squadrons. During the year, the LTD conducted IAT courses in Arabic, French, Polish, Russian, Spanish, Tagalog, and Thai.



Most of the IAT students who graduated this year were CAAs, both active duty and Air Force Reserve. Students also came to the LTD from the Language Enabled Airman Program (LEAP), US Army Civil Affairs, 7th Special Forces Group, Office






Many of these students experienced in country immersions, an outstanding opportunity to employ their language and culture skills in a country where they are likely to deploy operationally in the future.


To meet the operational requirements of AFSOC, the LTD is continuously developing courses for airmen with a wide range of language proficiency. From Familiarization courses, where the students come to us with zero language proficiency; to SETs, to enhance the students' current language skills; to intermediate and advanced courses, that provide students with higher level skills to ensure mission success; the LTD meets the diverse requirements of AFSOC continuously.

To better meet the needs of its customers stationed at Duke Field, the LTD also offers courses at the Duke Field Language Center. Although, no language professors are permanently assigned to Duke Field, the LTD ensures that professors in the appropriate languages are always available at the Language Center at Duke Field to meet AFSOC language requirements.








Significant Language Training Event


Target Population

27th Special Operations Wing Cannon AFB, New Mexico Courses conducted at Cannon








Mobile Education Events (MEEs) for AY19

Mobile Education Events continued to provide a unique high demand instructional asset to USAFSOS. Its capability to deliver customized operational military education and deployed cultural and language expertise at locations worldwide maximized AFSOC and SOF mission success. 

The Flight Leadership Course is an educational and mentorship-based course designed to proactively develop AFSOC's unit-level flight leadership teams into fully effective leaders. This will be achieved through improving understanding of flight leader roles, duties, and responsibilities, increasing proficiency in key flight-level leadership skills and behaviors, and introducing flight leaders to unit policies, programs, plans, and procedures.

Students will participate in instructor and student-led discussions, solve scenario-based challenges, and develop an Initial Action Plan in support of their role as a Flight Leader.

Target Audience: All students will accomplish this course prior to assuming flight leadership duties; unit leaders should proactively work with their wing-level leadership to schedule their members. Ideally, this course will be followed up by a wing-led event that builds upon this

course and trains members on local procedures, priorities, working with functional and key staff networks, etc. This is a nominative USAFSOS course and attendees must be submitted by their chain of command and approved at the wing or group (0-6) level.





Leadership Development is a 5-day educational course that has four modular areas of instruction. The first module lays out the strategic vision and mission of AFSOC while emphasizing the role of today's Airmen in leading current and future Special Operations Forces. The second module explores the legal, administrative, and financial responsibilities of SOF leaders within SOCOM organizations, providing students with a functional understanding of what resources are available at their disposal. The third module is devoted to specialized topics, including the importance of Total Force Integration (TFI), role of industry in furthering the AFSOC/SOCOM missions, introduction to the Air Commando Association, and effective writing/communications workshop. In the fourth module, the students engage in an in-class exercise employing different leadership scenarios that examine legal and ethical issues in real-world simulated situations.

Target Audience: Wing commander-nominated leadership development course designed to prepare high performing 0-3s/0-4s, MSgts, and GS-12s/13s for future leadership roles.







The IASOF course provides attendees with the general knowledge and skills necessary to successfully operate within a US interagency environment. 

This course is specially designed to address the infrastructure of an established, deployed location while examining pre-deployment, deployment, and post-deployment challenges. The course focuses on operational and support considerations for mission commanders including such topics as Air Force Special Operations doctrine, command and control relationships, rules of engagement, legal ramifications, risk management, safety, force protection, and senior enlisted perspectives. The course culminates with leadership perspectives from senior mentors who have served as deployed mission commanders.

Target Audience: This course is designed for Air Force Special Operations Command personnel who have been selected or have the potential to serve as a mission commander (MC) or Senior Enlisted Leader (SEL). This course primarily focuses on preparing future operational MCs and SELs but is open to all others on a space available basis. 

Application of concepts and procedures will be reinforced by class exercises to ensure students understand the coordination between SOF ground forces, the Joint Air Operations Center (JAOC)/Special Operations Liaison Element (SOLE), and SOF's integration into the conventional theater C2 structure.





Other military members, dependents, federal personnel, and other government employees can attend, as space is available.





It is geared towards individuals who have not received formal education and training regarding terrorism or antiterrorism. Strong emphasis is placed on force protection measures that potentially target AFSOC personnel and their families. Specific strategies are taught to minimize the threat index. Graduates of AT2 will be Level II certified and can perform the functions of ATOs IAW DoDI 2000.16, DoD Antiterrorism (AT) Standards.

Target Audience: Military officers (O-1 to O-4), enlisted (E-5 to E-8), US Government civilian employees designated by the commander to perform Antiterrorism (AT) duties and other

individuals involved in or supporting AT/Force Protection (FP) programs. ATOC is a nominative course. The S200CAA course is a 15-day educational course that consists of four major sections of instruction: W100 Introduction to Special Ops; Introduction to Irregular Warfare Course; C200ENGAGE; and the S200CAA course as required by training requirements. The first portion of the course provides the foundation on the fundamentals of Air Commandos. The second portion provides students with rudimentary concepts of irregular warfare (IW) and how IW relates to SOF missions. The third portion provides a solid foundation of cultural values and communications styles of specific countries and regions. The final portion of the course is devoted to specialized topics pertaining to Foreign Internal Defense (FID) doctrine, security cooperation activities, to include historical and current examples of AA support in FID.

The Combat Aviation Advising Course begins with an examination of insurgency and instability to frame the operational environment in which Combat Aviation Advisors (CAA) perform a FID mission. ICAAC give students a greater understanding of strategic and operational drivers, as well as the necessity for comprehensive, realistic assessments when planning and conducting FID missions. ICAAC has an integrated practical exercise with a strategic/operational perspective. Throughout the exercise, and the course, students apply knowledge/understanding to analyze, design, and present a FID plan,that will assist a notional host nation, and its air forces, in their efforts to provide security and stability to the population.





The Intercultural Competencies course is not tied to a particular Language, Region, or Culture (LRC). Therefore, it provides AFSOF with maximum adaptability for unforeseen or short-notice deployments and serves as a foundation for follow-on specific LRC learning prior to departure. The USAF Chief of Staff's Culture, Region and Language Flight Plan defines cross cultural competence (3C) (a.k.a. Intercultural Competence) as "the ability to quickly and accurately comprehend, then appropriately and effectively act, in culturally complex environments, to achieve the desired effect." This course provides an introduction to 3C concepts for all AFSOF.


Target Audience: The Intercultural Competencies course enables Special Operations Forces (SOF) excellence in complex and ambiguous operational environments world-wide. The primary audience includes SOF personnel who engage in direct, face-to-face interactions with foreign people as part of Irregular Warfare, Counterinsurgency, Counterterrorism, Foreign Internal Defense, Unconventional Warfare, medical operations, intelligence analysis, bilateral/multilateral exercise mission planning, Non-Standard Aviation, Civil Affairs, Military Information Support Operations, Humanitarian Assistance/Disaster Relief, Security Assistance and/or Foreign Military Sales. ICC is especially designed for SOF personnel anticipating a deployment outside CONUS. In addition, non-SOF government personnel who work or train with partner nations.



Intercultural Skills for Engagement



Course Code: C200ENGAGE

PDS Code: 820 Length: 5 Days

Total Course Hours: 31.5

The Intercultural Skills for Engagement course seeks to provide attendees with general knowledge and skills to quickly and accurately comprehend, then appropriately and effectively act, in a culturally complex environment to achieve the desired effect without necessarily having prior exposure to a particular group, region, or its language. Students apply communication and negotiation skills in role-playing scenarios, and are exposed to a variety of interactive exercises that challenge their cultural norms. Additionally, the course addresses topics in comparative religions, military culture, food and health concerns in an intercultural setting, and culture shock. With an emphasis on SOF focus, the course will draw on former and current SOF personnel to discuss case studies and relevant concepts to enhance student learning. Ultimately, this course is designed as an introduction to provide a solid foundation for students to conduct further research into the cultural values and communications styles of specific countries or regions.

Target Audience: Special Operations personnel who will be engaging in direct, face-to-face interactions with international personnel as part of their duties. This includes but is not limited to: Foreign Internal Defense, Irregular Warfare UTC medical personnel, bilateral/multilateral exercise mission planners, Non-Standard Aviation, Civil Affairs, Military Information Support Operations, and Foreign Military Sales. This course is especially constructed for personnel who anticipate going, but have not yet gone, on a deployment that requires this type of interaction. Other government personnel who anticipate working or training with international personnel will also benefit from this course.





MOIC prepares AFSOC and other selected SOF instructors to develop and teach curriculum. Students will develop skills by creating active learning environments focused on higher levels of learning by implementing various instructional methodologies. A brief overview of learning theory, the Instructional Systems Development process, and development of level-of-learning lesson plans is provided to allow immediate application of the instructional strategies that are discussed and practiced within the course. The course introduces learning evaluation and addresses basic principles in test item validity and construction. Students teach a variety of lessons using different instructional methodologies. The instructional methods taught in the course include lecture, guided discussion, case study, experiential learning, teaching interviews/panel discussions and demonstration performance. The course is delivered in a group lock step format. The Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) awards 3-SH for this course.

Target Audience: AFSOC faculty members are the top priority and SOF personnel teaching in any service or joint education/training environment. MOIC is a SOF academic instructor course.


